

BASS TWIRLED A BEAUTIFUL GAME

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., May 15.—(Special)—Richmond made it two out of three to-day, winning hands down by a score of 6 to 2. Though the score gave six errors to the visitors, they did not count much, and the victory was largely due to the brilliant fielding of the Richmond boys, coupled with fine work in the box by Bass, of whom the Ship-Builders could secure but three hits.

STOCKS SHOW RELIEF

THEY RECOVER VIGOROUSLY FROM EARLY ACUTE DEPRESSION.

SUBSTANTIAL NET GAINS

Perceptible Growth of Confidence That Hostilities in Struggle for Control of Northern Pacific Will in Some Way Be Adjusted.

NEW YORK, May 15.—The stock market showed emphatic symptoms of relief late to day, and recovered vigorously from its early acute depression, rising strongly over last night's level, and establishing substantial net gains in a majority of stocks.

At one time during the day prices had declined in a fairly sensational manner, the losses from last night's level extending for over 40 points in a large number of important stocks. The level of net gains at the highest is the more remarkable, considering the acute weakness earlier in the day.

The progress of liquidation, which caused the early weakness was in itself an immense relief to the situation. It is growing assurance of the recovery of Stock Exchange houses, who were emerging from any dangers that may have beset them by the rapid conversion of their resources into cash assets.

The opening gains, in sympathy with the higher prices in London, were quickly wiped out by this continued liquidation. The selling came at spasmodic intervals, and for the greater part of the day in the form of buying orders. On the successive down-grades there were some buying orders met, but they did not follow the market upward, until the last rally had set in. When it became evident that the market was to be safely held, and there was a large reserve force behind the rally, the buying orders grew in volume, and in fact, were largest at about the top level.

GOLD EXPORTS. The announcement of gold exports to the extent of \$2,200,000, and the weakly crop bulletin of the Government Weather Bureau, reporting the growth of the crops retarded by the unseasonable weather, helped to calm the market.
