THE RED MEN. Meeting of Virginia Great Council Yesterday. ALEXANDRIA, VA., May 15.—(Special)—The Great Council, Improved Order of Red Men, of the State of Virginia, commenced their annual session in Serepta Hall, on King street, at 5 o'clock this morning.

Mayor George L. Simpson delivered an address of welcome on behalf of the city, which was appropriate for the occasion. This morning's session was taken up with the transaction of routine business. This afternoon the delegates went to Mount Vernon.

About eighty delegates are in attendance on the session and will be concluded tomorrow afternoon, when the annual election of officers will take place. SOUTH BOSTON NOTES. First National Bank Getting Ready for Business.

SOUTH BOSTON, VA., May 15.—(Special)—Rooms are being prepared for the First National Bank, which will open its doors for business some time in June. The capital is \$25,000. R. H. Edmundson is president and J. D. Tucker vice-president. The following are the directors: W. C. Slate, H. A. Edmundson, W. D. Hill, A. H. Vaughan, J. M. Carrington, J. J. Stegall, Dr. W. H. Mosely. There are now three banks here—two at Houston and one at Virginia. No county in the State has more conveniently-located banks than Halifax.

Mr. R. M. C. Glenn, a big dealer in leaf tobacco, is preparing to build a large brick stemmer. Four brick stores on Main street are in course of construction. There were big breaks of tobacco at all the warehouses yesterday. The Century Cotton-Mill commenced work on Monday. This will add greatly to the business of the town. Since Charlotte county has no licensed saloons, it is learned that several distilleries will soon be in operation in the "dryest" parts of the county. Notwithstanding the barrooms in this town have to pay a corporation license of \$300, there are four successful operations, with prospects of more.

Mr. W. C. Hudson, son of Mr. H. Calvin Hudson, of Scotsburg, was married this afternoon to Miss Lottie Noel, daughter of Mr. Charles Noel, near Houston. The ceremony was performed by Rev. W. J. Shipman, of Prince Edward, at the home of the bride's parents. Mr. Hudson is a young man who is engaged in the tobacco warehouse business in Winston, N. C.

Mrs. L. A. R. Easley, mother of Mr. Easley, of the Planters and Merchants, is critically ill. In remote sections of the county there are several cases of small-pox. It is of a mild form and creates no alarm. The Executive Committee of the county will meet on Monday, May 27th—today to fix the time and manner of selecting delegates to the Norfolk convention.

NEW WATER-WORKS. Staunton Overwhelmingly Votes for Bonds for the Purpose. STAUNTON, VA., May 15.—(Special)—Prohibitionists and nearly everybody else voted "wet" today, in a sort of local option special election on the question of empowering the city to expend the capital in erecting a supply of soft water by the gravity system. Overwhelmingly was the bond issue authorized, and soon a soft water system will supersede the present inadequate supply of hard water. DANVILLE DOINGS. Epworth League District Conference in Session With Good Attendance. DANVILLE, VA., May 15.—(Special)—Hon. N. H. Halston, ex-Judge of Henry County Court, passed through here to-night, for Birmingham, Ala., to assist in the defense of Louis Gravelly. He volunteered his services, and pays his own expenses. The Epworth League District Conference now in session at Mt. Vernon church in this city, is being well attended. Rev. W. B. Beauchamp, of Richmond, delivered a fine address here to-night. There are about 160 delegates, and the audience is nightly large. The conference closes to-morrow.

FROM PETERSBURG ARRIVAL OF THE FIRST MASSACHUSETTS HEAVY ARTILLERY.

VETERANS REVISIT BATTLE-FIELDS Ex-Confederates of the Cockade City Give Them a Happy Welcome—The Day State Men Will Also Go to Spotsylvania Courthouse.

PETERSBURG, VA., May 15.—(Special)—The First Massachusetts Heavy Artillery Association, comprising fifty-four members, and accompanied by ten ladies, arrived in Petersburg from Norfolk shortly after 11 o'clock this morning.

The visitors came quietly, to remain here two days, and expecting no formal reception. In what followed they were taken greatly by surprise. The veterans of A. P. Hill Camp, in full uniform, and headed by their fine drum corps, marched down to the depot, took the Massachusetts veterans bodily in charge, and escorted them to the camp hall, on Tabb street.

The visitors received a most cordial welcome in an admirable address, by Commander J. E. Harwood, delivered on behalf of A. P. Hill Camp, and a welcome to the city by the residents.

Happy responses were made by Colonel J. W. Hart, commanding the visiting veterans, and by Mr. J. Payson Bradley, who was introduced as the youngest member of the Artillery Association, expressing sincere gratitude for the unexpected and cordial reception given them. The occasion was a very delightful one in all respects, and the more enjoyed because of the surprise attending it.

Following the address a fine spread was partaken of, and social intercourse prevailed for some time. The visitors were then taken to their headquarters, at the Imperial Hotel. The interest in the ceremonies at the Camp Hall was attested not only by large numbers of the Confederate veterans, but by a very large attendance of citizens generally.

GOING ABOARD. This afternoon the visitors were taken over to the State Normal College; to-morrow they will visit the battle-fields, with which they were familiar in the days of 1861-65, and to-morrow evening they will leave for Richmond.

To-night a camp-fire was kindled in the A. P. Hill Camp Hall, where many informal "war talks" took place, and was experienced given on both sides. The Heavy Artillery Association goes to Spotsylvania to unveil a monument to the memory of 339 of their dead, who were killed in the battle of Chancellorsville.

Mr. J. Payson Bradley was a bugler in the Heavy Artillery at the age of 13 years. He brought with him to-day the same bugle that he carried in the war. The Massachusetts veterans are mostly solid business-men, gentlemen in their demeanor, and a very fine-looking body of citizens.

GENERAL NEWS. Mr. W. V. Green, a well-known young citizen, while walking near the battle-fields, on South Sycamore street, last evening, was taken suddenly ill and fell to the pavement, sustaining bodily injuries. It is thought he had a slight apoplectic attack. His condition improved this morning.

W. J. Atkinson, of Louisa, who was sent to jail here for jumping his bond bill at the Imperial Hotel, and who was subsequently indicted by the United States grand jury for fraudulently obtaining a registered package from the post-office here, was taken to New York to-day for trial. The evidence is so positive against him that it is thought he will plead guilty.

Mrs. W. R. White and daughter, Miss Leigh White of El Paso, Tex., are visiting at the home of Captain P. C. Hoy, in this city. Mrs. Mary V. Duggan, wife of Mr. David B. Duggan, died last night.

Colonel Baker Reported Ill. Colonel James Carr Baker, of Newport News, is reported quite ill at his home, in that city. Colonel Baker is well-known in Richmond. During the Spanish-American war he commanded the Second Virginia Regiment, in which were several Richmond companies.
