NEWS OF PETERSBURG.

THE SHOOTING AT THE ALMSHOUSE FARM.

HITCHCOCK WAIVES EXAMINATION. Sent on to the Grand Jury—No One Saw the Dead—A Pastor Resigns—Negro Out in Several Places—Other Mention.

PETERSBURG, VA., June 14.—(Special.) John Hitchcock, charged with the murder of Frank McAllister on the city almshouse farm last evening, was before the Mayor's court this morning, appearing without counsel. When asked if he was ready for a hearing he waived examination and asked that the case be sent on to the Hustings Court, which was done, and the witnesses were recognized for their appearance before the grand jury on June 20th.

Both the accused and the victim were inmates of the almshouse, and had been for some time. Hitchcock is an intelligent white man—a carpenter by trade—and until an accident several years ago, by which he was disabled, he was heard to say that there would be trouble of one of his kind he was well-to-do. He has, however, in recent years been addicted to drink. McAllister was a respectable colored man, but disabled by the infirmities of age, and almost a cripple.

The last track made by Hitchcock was but a few minutes before the shooting, when, as he was entering the lane leading from the porch to West-End Park, with a gun in his hands, he was heard to say that there would be trouble in less than half an hour. And very soon thereafter the report of a gun discharge was heard in the direction in which Hitchcock had gone, and he was seen to return with the gun, which was found to have been discharged. Some time afterwards the dead body of McAllister was found in the lane, with a hole the size of a silver dollar in his temple, and the brain oozing out.

Dr. Booth received a slight injury on the arm, and the driver was unhurt.

Wilmington Aldermen Pass a Booming Ordinance and Suffer Thereby. WILMINGTON, N. C., June 14.—(Special.)—Several weeks ago the City Council of Wilmington adopted an ordinance, making it compulsory, under penalty of a \$50 fine, for ice-dealers to furnish each of their delivery wagons with standard scales, and permitting the customers, when it is so desired, to weigh or superintend the weighing of each block of ice purchased.

Property of R. G. Dennis, at Corapeake, N. C. SUFFOLK, VA., June 14.—(Special.)—R. G. Dennis's saw mill at Corapeake, N. C., was totally destroyed by fire early this morning, presumably from sparks from the stacks. A barrel factory and also a broom-handle plant, owned and operated by Mr. Dennis, and situated, by came near burning, but timely aid and the use of force pumps, saved these buildings. The loss is estimated at \$2,300; insurance \$1,100. The owner will rebuild.
