REDUCED SALARIES. EASTERN HOSPITAL DIRECTORS CUT PAY OF OFFICERS. HAVE ORDERED ELECTRIC FANS.

WILLIAMSBURG, Va., July 18.—(Special.)—The Board of Directors of the Eastern State Hospital met at that institution to-day. There was a full attendance, the members being Captain Terence McCracken, of Fredericksburg, who was elected chairman; H. D. Cole, of Williamsburg; J. F. Hubbard, of York; Walter A. Watson, of Nottoway; B. R. Cowherd, of Fluvanna; Eugene Ould, of Campbell; G. E. Smith, of Lunenburg; and Judge G. G. Barnett, of Middlesex.

Mr. Archer Brooks was elected steward and storekeeper of the hospital to fill the unexpired term of the late C. P. Armistead. The salary of the office, however, was reduced from \$1,150 to \$800 per annum. The steward is required to give a bond of \$20,000. The reduction was made because of the action of the Legislature in fixing a maximum amount to be paid to all officers, from superintendent down.

ANOTHER SALARY REDUCED. Mr. C. P. Wynkoop was elected chief engineer and superintendent of motive power to succeed Captain J. H. Topham, resigned. The engineer's salary was reduced from \$1,200 to \$900. The board decided also, in response to the recommendation of Superintendent L. S. Foster, to place electric fans in the dining-rooms and the infirmary and gave the Executive Committee power to purchase a new hank for the hospital.

AN ALLEGED "SPEAKEASY." Thaddeus Routen and Mrs. Witte Arrested at Buckroe Yesterday. NEWPORT NEWS, Va., July 18.—(Special.)—Thaddeus Routen and Mrs. E. C. Witte were arrested to-day at Buckroe Beach for conducting a "speakeasy." The Beach management permits no liquor on the grounds, and for this reason the place is the principal excursion resort in the State, being especially popular with churches in cities near and far. It is charged that the woman and the man sold whiskey in the rear of the building in which ostensibly they sold soda-water and confections. The United States authorities will take a hand in the cases. The arrests were made at the instance of the Beach management. Police-Justice Brown to-day fined three more plumbing firms for using black iron pipe for vents contrary to the city ordinance. They are Drew & Dodder, E. C. Stone & Co., and the Sanitary Construction Company. Several other firms had to be discharged because the principal witnesses had left the city, presumably to avoid testifying. J. D. Cheney, the undertaker who was arrested on the charge of burying infants in his back yard, will have a hearing to-morrow. He claims that the charges were brought through spite by a man who owes him money. The hearing on this case will be held on Monday.

SEVENTY-FIRST HAS AN Imitation of War—A Fruitless Conference. NORFOLK, Va., July 18.—(Special.)—The Seventy-First Regiment, which was to have a sham battle on a large scale at Ocean View this afternoon, almost the entire Seventy-first Regiment, participating in the brilliant maneuvers, Colonel M. Higgins was in general charge. Eleven companies of infantry and two batteries of artillery participated. The battery of artillery was overcome by heat, and an artilleryman suffered a painful wound in the hand. There was a conference at the Seaboard Air-Line shops this morning between Mr. McChesney, superintendent of motive power, and the men of the Seaboard Air-Line striking machinists, and, though matters relating to the existing trouble between the machinists and the railroad were discussed, no conclusions were reached, owing to the fact that the committee made a settlement by their body to a pleasant one, however, and a second conference was arranged for the strikers' distance to consult. It is hoped that the "end of the strike is in sight." Late last night a sailor imprisoned on the Seaboard Air-Line at Southern, at the navy-yard, made a bold attempt to escape by springing over the deck of the vessel. The man was a considerable distance up the rigging, but was captured by a boat's crew sent out from the ship. It is expected that there will be a hot fight between Messrs. Lawrence Groener and Hugh G. Miller for the Republican nomination for attorney-general. Both aspirants are from this city, and have powerful backing.

OUR OLDEST CONSUL DEAD. GIBRALTAR, July 18.—Horatio J. Sprigg, United States Consul at Gibraltar, and the oldest American Consul in the world, died here to-day. He was from Massachusetts, and was appointed originally by Andrew Jackson.

NEGRO BOY'S STRANGE DEATH. DRAKE'S BRANCH, Va., July 18.—(Special.)—Two colored boys named Blumke were beating their way home to Clover, Va., this morning. When the couple will leave on the Baltimore steamer for a northern trip. PETERSBURG COURT NEWS. Alfred Scott Gets Two Years—Robbed His Companion. PETERSBURG, Va., July 18.—(Special.)—Mr. Charles I. Brown, of Dinwiddie county, through his attorney, Mr. R. H. Mann, has brought suit in the Hustings Court for \$2,000 damages against the Southside Railway and Development Company. It was stated that the suit will be tried during the present term. Some weeks ago one of the company's electric cars ran into Mr. Brown's team, killing his horse and throwing Mr. Brown upon the ground, causing bodily injuries. The declaration alleges negligence on the part of the company, and hence the suit. The July term of the Hustings Court began this morning. The grand jury found indictments against John Hitchcock (white), for the murder of Frank McAllister (colored); Alfred Scott (colored) for house-breaking and larceny, and Perry Daniels (colored), for felonious stabbing and cutting. CASE OF ALFRED SCOTT. Scott was tried and convicted to-day and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. He was handsomely defended by Captain Charles T. Lassiter, who undoubtedly secured a light sentence. Scott has a wife and eight children dependent upon him. The charge against him was breaking and entering the store of Mr. P. Rafferty and stealing four tin boxes. He was indicted on the act of collecting the money for one of the packages from a person to whom he had sold it. He swore upon the stand that he was innocent of the crime, and that he had received two tin boxes of butter from one Lewis Parham, who had asked him to sell the butter and divide the proceeds. Parham swore positively that he had not given a tin box to Scott and had not seen him for two months. The case of John Hitchcock, indicted for the murder of Frank McAllister, was set for trial on the 24th instant. Hitchcock and McAllister were both inmates of the city almshouse, and the tragedy occurred there. McAllister was shot to death with a gun, and the cause of the killing is said to have been jealousy. The High-Street Methodist Episcopal church excursion party to Buckroe Beach this morning via the Seaboard Air-Line filled eighteen coaches, running in two sections.

REPAIRS AT BYRD-STREET. Train Movement in and out of the Station Temporarily Suspended. Train movement in and out of Byrd-Street Station has been suspended by the Atlantic-Coast Line temporarily. The reason for this lies in the fact that the old wall, built more than sixty years ago, north of Arch street, on the eastern side of the railroad tracks, running into the train-shed, has given certain indications of weakness recently. A large force has been put to work to make the necessary repairs, and the management of the road has been advised to suspend all train movements until the repairs are completed.

The hanging took place in the jail yard here, and was witnessed by about 200 people. The condemned men were Babe Brown, Luther Thompson, and Abe Petway.
