Washington.—The Secretary of the Treasury has ordered that the first cigars which are imported from a foreign country may bring into this country without payment of duty.



The Sinking Fund. Section 7. The General Assembly shall provide by law a sinking fund, to be applied solely to the payment and extinguishment of such State debt; and every law creating a debt shall be created by, or on behalf of the State, except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repeal invasions, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to pay existing debts.
