BRITISH TRANSPORT FIRED.

Captain Parry's Enemies, It is Thought, Applied the Torch. NEWPORT NEWS, VA., September 26.—(Special.)—Captain Parry, of the British mail transport Monterey, who has been in hot water ever since his arrival from South Africa, en route to New Orleans, has had more trouble. This time his ship was fired, working on the Chesapeake Bay, and it is suspected that some of the discharged seamen, smarting under the Court's dismissal of the charge they brought against him, are responsible for the blaze. Fire was discovered in a forward hatch on the Monterey, which is tied up at the ship-yard, early this morning. The flames spread rapidly, destroying a large quantity of baled hay, charring the woodwork, and wrapping some of the forward plating. The shipyard fire department, and the city department, had the flames under control in several hours. It is probable that a survey will have to be held to determine the extent of the damage.

LYNCHING BARELY AVERTED.

A Negro Ruffian Invades a Lady's Bedroom and is Captured. BLEWISVILLE, VA., September 27.—(Special.)—It became known that a negro was arrested here this morning and quietly taken to the county jail for sending a lady's room in a hotel in a semi-nude condition and making improper proposals to her. Many people have become excited, and a lynching would have undoubtedly occurred to-night had the negro been incarcerated in the city jail, which is an insecure structure. The young lady gave the alarm immediately upon the negro's appearance, and several people rushed to her assistance. The negro gave no indication of fear, and when an officer arrived he resisted, and was in the act of brandishing a policeman with a coal-scuttle when the bluecoat knocked him down. The negro had been employed at the place for some time, and never bore a very good reputation.
