Ashtand: Three precincts give Montague 59 majority; Cardwell, 413 majority; Edwards, 357 majority. Estimated that Montague has 350 majority; Cardwell, 600; Edwards, 300 in county.

Hanover Courthouse: Partial returns and all indications give Montague a safe majority, and a large Democratic vote, for Legislature, large majority. The vote on independent candidates from Hanover and King William, will be close in this county.

Hunter Courthouse: Returns from Rural Point Precinct give Montague 113, Hoge, 236; Cardwell, for Legislature, 332; Edwards (Democrat), for Hanover and King William, 142; Mitchell (Republican), 237.

King William. Indications point to King William's having gone Republican by about 200 majority.

West Point: The election in this county passed off quietly. An average vote was polled, with the following result: West Point, Montague, 84; Hoge, 84; Edwards, for the House, 130; Mitchell (Republican), 62.

Lancaster: Montague, 83; Hoge, 149; Edwards, 87; Mitchell, 151.

Courthouse: Montague, 56; Hoge, 149; Edwards, 87; Mitchell, 151.

Manquin: Montague, 117; Hoge, 122; Edwards, 70; Mitchell, 113.

Manokin and Beulahville yet to hear from.

Edwards will probably win by 250 majority in Hanover.

Boona Vista Precinct, in King and Queen, gives Bland, for the House, 183 majority, and Montague 72 majority.

West Point: There was a good vote polled here, and Montague, 126; Hoge, 84; Willard, 128; Dickenson, 69; Anderson, 140; Groner, 47; Edwards, 170; Mitchell (Republican), 237.

Goochland. Six precincts out of eleven in Goochland give Hoge (Republican), 103 majority over Montague for Governor; 70 (Republican), 41, majority over Wright (Republican) for the House.

With five precincts yet to hear from, the indications are that Hoge will carry the county over Montague by a large majority, and Leake (Democrat) over Wright (Republican) for the House, by about 100 majority.

New Kent. It is probable that New Kent has gone Republican. The opposition majority will be about as 250. The normal voting strength of the county is: White, 430 colored, 684.

FIRST DISTRICT. Accomac. Only: The lightest vote in the history of Accomac and Northampton counties was polled to-day for Governor and members of the Legislature.

Windsor: The election-day to-day was noticeable on account of the quietness of everything. The Democratic ticket for representative, ran 105 votes ahead of his ticket, getting a majority of 111 over W. S. Holland (Republican).

The count given out for Windsor Precinct is as follows: Montague, 191; Hoge, 23; Montague's majority 68, as against a Democratic majority of only 6 in 1900. Willard, 29; Dickenson, 23; Anderson, 102; Groner, 29; Branch, 12; Holland, 1. Montague's majorities at: Hall's Store, 106; Isle of Wight, Courthouse, 160; Smithfield, 200; Zuni, 10; Baker's Store, 70; Burrill's Bay, 180; Carrollton, 153; Longview, 76. Hoge got a majority of 24 in Carrollton, and a majority of 10 in Burrill's Bay. Montague's majority will probably reach 1,000. Branch ran 300 ahead of his ticket.

James City. Toano: Stonehouse District, James City county, gives Montague 41; Willard, 41; Anderson, 38; Hoge, 9; Dickenson, 14; Groner, 13; Stearns (Democrat), for the House, 42. The other candidates received a very small vote.

Powhatan District, James City county, gives Montague 291; Willard, 201; Anderson, 20; Hoge, 9; Dickenson, 49; Groner, 49; Stearns, for the House, 230.

Nansemond. The vote in Nansemond county was very light. In Suffolk precincts, the vote was made to get the Democrats to turn out. Montague's majority in Suffolk is 141 against 193 for Tyler four years ago, on a somewhat lighter total vote.

At 10 o'clock Chairman Jordan estimates Montague's majority in Nansemond county will be 400; Tyler's majority was 672. Hon. Walter Jordan, for House of Delegates, had no opposition.

Newport News. The straight Democratic ticket carried here to-day with sweeping majorities.

The election was devoid of interest, the vote being lighter than in 1900, and the precincts being about 500 than in 1900.

The vote for Governor, which indicates the way the full ticket went, was as follows: Montague (Democrat), 1,377; Hoge (Republican), 408; Quantz (Socialist), 20; Rucker (Prohibitionist), 21.

For Legislature, Stearns (Democrat) won by 1,276 majority.

Norfolk City and County. Norfolk: Late in the evening, the county, that Fusion goes to the Senate and Owen to the House, defeating Coleman and Halstead.

The Norfolk Landmark's returns, complete and official from the city, give Montague a majority of 2,088 out of a total of 5,522.

The Trehy faction's candidates—Whitehead and Woodward—so to the House, defeating Lamb and Bibb. Good Government, elected to the Senate by 4,388 majority.

The vote of the city is as follows: Montague, 3,751; Hoge, 1,622; White, 323; Dickenson, 1,499; Hoge, 1,982; White, 2,555; Ward, 2,249; Bibb, 2,441; Lambeth, 2,555.

For Legislature, Stearns (Democrat) received 2,319, while Groner's home city gave him 1,620. Returns but from one Princess Anne county precinct have been received.

Charles P. Portsmouth by nearly 2,000 House for the entire vote majority.

It is shown by the returns that the 1,200 colored majority of the fourth Ward was necessary to elect the Trehy faction, defeating the Day faction. The latter take their vote to-day. They charge fraud against the machine and threaten a contest.

Northumberland. In Northumberland county five out of seven precincts heard from give Hoge majority over Montague, and Ball (Republican) over Baber (Democrat) 105 majority for the House of Delegates.

The two precincts heard from are usually Republican, and should reduce the Republican majority.

Baker, having carried Westmoreland.

ocrats expected. The negroes practically remained away from the polls.

Gloucester: Full returns from this county give Montague 677 majority; Hunley, for the House, 604; Sears, for the Senate (no opposition), 1,232.

Irvington: Lancaster county gives Montague a majority of 287. John M. Lyell, Democratic nominee for the House, had no opposition, and polled nearly the combined Democratic and Republican vote. A very light vote was polled throughout the county.

Middlesex. In three precincts in Middlesex county, Montague gets 67 majority; Lawson, for the House, 11 majority.

One other precinct is to be heard from; that will swell Montague's majority to 125 and Lawson's to 50.

Mathews. Mathews goes largely Democratic. Montague's majorities are 602; Hunley, 593; Sears, 823. One precinct to hear from; it will but slightly alter the above figures.

Eastville: The election in Northampton passed off very quietly. There were a great many negroes who voted, but little interest was taken by the white voters. The fact that the Democratic nominees for the House had no opposition.

Montague's majority will be about 350. Nottingham, for the House of Delegates, was elected by a large majority. LeCato and Mathews, from Accomac, were both elected without opposition.

Cape Charles: The approximate result of the election in Northampton is a majority for Montague, which was heard from, except Hog Island, which has only about 15 votes. In all, Montague's majority in Northampton is about 400, in over two-thirds of a full vote cast throughout the county.

Spotylvania. Fredericksburg: From returns received from the county it appears the Democrats carried it by majorities ranging from 100 to 200.

The Republicans claimed it. Our State Senator and member of the House are undoubtedly elected.

Manchester, and Powhatan, in addition to voting for State officers, chose two representatives to the House of Delegates. Returns from Manchester and Swansboro are complete, but only scattered returns are in from other points. Manchester gives Montague a plurality over Hoge. It is estimated that Chesterfield will give at least 300 for the State ticket. Powhatan has probably gone Republican.

Portsmouth. Portsmouth city goes Democratic by 1,915. Hoge ran ahead of his ticket. Coleman (Straight) has a heavy majority in the city over Cromwell (Fusionist) for the Senate, which the county returns may alter, although precincts reported give him majority in both. Complete returns from Norfolk city indicate the triumph of the Trehy faction.

Southampton County. Franklin: This precinct gives Montague 283; Hoge, 15. The same precinct in 1900 gave Bryan 270 majority. Four precincts in this county—Southampton—give Montague 646; Hoge, 107. The same precincts in 1900 gave Bryan 736; McKinley, 270. This shows a falling off in the Democratic vote, but a gain at these four precincts of 153 Democratic majority. If the present ratio of increase keeps up the county will give Montague 1,300 majority.

Claremont: Claremont returns—Montague, 24; Hoge, 60; Willard, 27; Dickenson, 55; Anderson, 25; Groner, 56; Slade, 14; Clarke, 15; Savage, 58; Hobbs, 60; Malory, 17.

Newport News: Warwick county—Montague, 630; Hoge, 197; Stearns, for Legislature, 610.

Newport News: Three districts heard from in this county—Hoge, 86; Anderson, 82; Groner, 183; Stearns, for Legislature, 437; Schade, 6.

Question No. 1, 282 votes for it and 9 against; question No. 2, 81 votes for and 235 votes against. The Democratic ticket in Bruton District not heard from, but material.

Amelia. The election passed off quietly here to-day, only about half a vote being polled at this precinct. It was carried for the Democratic ticket by a majority of about thirty-five. It is probable that the county has gone Democratic by a small majority.

Lawrenceville. Lawrenceville precinct gives Montague, Willard and Anderson, 128 majority; Elam (Democrat), for the Legislature, 223 majority.

Indications are that they will carry the county by a good majority. A very light vote was polled.

Dinwiddie. Dinwiddie: The vote at this precinct was as follows: Montague, 49; Hoge, 34; Orain, 122; Smith, 3; McIlwaine, 124.

Monk's Neck precinct: Total vote, 70; Montague, 4; Hoge, 26; Orain, 30; Smith, 22; McIlwaine, 68.

Brookland: Total vote, 153; Montague, 152; Orain, 151; McIlwaine, 151.

The indications are that Montague and the State ticket have carried the county by at least 500, and that Orain is elected by 300. McIlwaine got practically all the votes cast. The negroes did not turn out.

Mecklenburg. Baydon: The five precincts have been heard from in Mecklenburg, which give the following vote: Baydon, Montague, 188; Hoge, 289; for Senate, Hutcherson (Democrat), 303; Jones Green, 117.

Stony Creek: The judges closed and left without giving out the figures. There was a light vote. Stony Creek is estimated as very close, with doubt as to success for the Democrat. The legislative ticket to-night; others tomorrow.

Greenhill. Emporia: Returns from three out of the six precincts in this county give the State Democratic ticket, and Hobbs, for the Senate, a majority of about 450, and P. F. Hoge, a majority of about 400. These are the three largest precincts.

It is safe to say that the whole Democratic vote in this county is a good majority in the county of Greensville.

Notaway. Blackstone: A good white vote was cast in the county. Negro vote was very light. One other precinct is to be heard from. It will probably increase the majority above 550 in the county.

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
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At the last election, between Davis (Republican) and Lee (Democrat), for the Constitutional Convention, Lee carried the precinct by one vote, and Davis received a majority of 200 in the county.

There is no doubt that Montague and the rest of the State ticket have carried the county.

Patrick. Stuart: A small vote was polled in this county. Four precincts heard from out of nineteen, give Montague 7 majority, and Mays (Democrat), 190 majority. The county is close for the State ticket. Mays is elected by 300 or 400.

Stuart: Indications are that Patrick county has gone for Mays (Democrat), over Adams (Republican), for the Legislature, by from three to four hundred.

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The county is close between the State ticket. Rather a small vote polled.

Wytheville: Grayson county gives Hoge 250 majority over Montague.

Martinsville: The two largest precincts in this county—Martinsville and Ridge-way—give Hoge 182 majority—a Republican gain of 94 over 1900.

Indications give the county to the Republicans by 400. Republican gain, 300.

Bedford. Bedford City: There has possibly never been a quieter election held in Bedford. The vote in the town stands: Montague, 314; Hoge, 289; Rucker, 39. The vote last year was Bryan, 437; McKinley, 424. As this is the home of the Prohibition candidate, Montague's majority is reduced to 25. Murrell and Turpin are elected by a heavy majority. In the town the vote was as follows: Montague, 314; Willard, 315; Anderson, 318. Legislature—Murrell, 145; Turpin, 439. Hoge, 289; Dickenson, 279; Groner, 279; Rucker, 39; Bun-dick, 72; Lee, 7. Legislature, Major, 118; Beahm, 128.
