of the many lectures that have been delivered before the Woman's Club, one stands out pre-eminent, that of Mrs. Howard Taylor's personal experience in China, which took place at 4:30 o'clock yesterday. The lecture was given in the hall of the Woman's Club, and was a most interesting and valuable one.

The speaker, Mrs. Howard Taylor, is the daughter of the Rev. H. Grattan Ghinn, the founder of a mission school in China, and she has spent several years in that country. Her story of the inland mission is so remarkable as to savor of the fantastic. Started only thirty-six years ago, it has over 1,000 missionaries, half of whom are Chinese. The whole work of the mission is done by the Chinese natives.

No donations are begged for and no collections taken up at the services and at the end of each month all the money in the treasury is sent to China and the new month starts without a dollar in the treasury.

Mrs. Taylor has a single teacher being returned home for lack of salary. Just before Mrs. Taylor left China on account of Dr. Taylor's ill health, a terrible riot occurred in the "foreign devils" were responsible for the failure in the crops which had occurred three times in succession. Rendered desperate by famine, they attacked the mission, destroyed the goods, and prepared to destroy the missionaries. When the mandarin of the province, accompanied by a large guard, came to their rescue. A wonderful feature of the incident was the conversion of a Chinese official scholar, and the resignation of the missionaries said: "The God that these people worship must be the living God, and that's the God for me." Dr. and Mrs. Taylor will return to China within the week and take up their work in the Province of Houan. After the lecture light refreshments were served and an informal reception held. SAVE BAD WOMAN'S CHILD.

Proceedings of Children's Home Society to Secure a Little Girl.

The Children's Home Society has instituted proceedings in the Chancery Court for the legal possession of a bright 7-year-old girl, whose mother is one of the children of Exchange alley, and whose father is in the Almshouse in Petersburg. The father of the little girl has relinquished any legal right he may have to the possession of the child. Dr. Maybee, the president of the society in company with a policeman, went to the home of the woman and endeavored to secure her consent to having the child placed in a good home. She demurred, saying she would have nothing to do with it and wanted her child. Dr. Maybee quietly took possession of the girl, and there is no doubt but that Judge Lamb will decree him all legal right to find her a happy home when the case come up for hearing on February 10th.

When Dr. Maybee approached the child and told her of his mission she gladly accompanied him and will be glad to have a good home. The father and mother have not lived together for five or six years.

Dr. Maybee has had a number of applications for the young girl who came to Richmond from Danville, and was rescued by the society. All of these applications are being inquired into, and the best thing possible for the girl will be done. In the interim she has found a nice home and employment in one of the mills of the city. She is attending services regularly, is pleased with her new life, and grateful to Dr. Maybee for his efforts in her behalf.

Dr. Maybee recently formed a branch of the State Society at Staunton. He has a strong bond there and hopes to be able to accomplish much good through its instrumentality.
