UNITED BRETHREN. Their One Hundred and Third Annual Conference. HARRISBURG, VA., March 12.—(Special.)—The 163d session of the Virginia Annual Conference of the United Brethren Church will begin at Lacey Springs, in this county, to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.
