

THE NEGRO'S FUTURE. SENATOR MORGAN'S LETTER TO THE COLORED BAPTISTS OF VA.

NO HOPE FOR NEGRO HERE. He Must Emigrate—The Suggestion Causes a Lively Discussion in the Petersburg Convention, and Nobody is Found to Support It.

PETERSBURG, VA., May 15.—(Special.) The session of the Virginia Baptist Convention (colored) to-day was one of marked interest, and the large Gilliam church was crowded from pulpit to the doors with delegates and spectators.

Several hundred visitors came up from Norfolk to spend the day with the convention, and these served to increase the crowd in the church.

After religious devotions the convention was called to order for business, and about sixty visitors of prominence were introduced and extended the usual greetings and privileges.

THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS. Secretary Fox called for the consideration of the address of President H. Bowling, which addressed a profound impression and is destined to cause much discussion.

THE LETTER FROM SENATOR MORGAN. The letter from Senator Morgan was then read. It follows: "I will not attempt to qualify myself to give advice by asserting that I have higher conceptions of the capabilities of the negro race than you do."

THE NEGRO'S CAPABILITIES. "I will say, however, not in the way of advice, but of admiration, that whatever may be their capabilities, the country can not be so reformed as to give their capabilities free scope and fair play."

AN INVITING HOME ELSEWHERE. "When the negro race believes in its capacity for the highest Christian civilization, and is ready to prove its faith by its works, they will seek a home where they are free from white competition, and are no longer misled by false hopes of rivalry or of social identification with the white race."

A NEGRO MORES REQUIRED. "The negroes in Africa are not migratory, and their American descendants have the same instinctive traits. They chain themselves to the soil whether or not it is generous to them."

COLONIZATION WOULD BE RE-SISTED. "If a colony of 500,000 negroes should move to a State of the North or West it would be met on the border by armed forces that would drive it back or destroy it."

THE FAIRVILLE CONVENTION. Rev. S. H. Thompson addresses the Negroes—The Days' Incident. FAIRVILLE, VA., May 15.—(Special.) The Baptist General Association (colored) of Virginia opened its second-day session this morning at 10 o'clock with devotional exercises.

THE FAIRVILLE CONVENTION. Rev. S. H. Thompson, of the white Baptist church, of Fairville, was introduced to the body, and addressed it at length. He stated, among other things, that he was just from the convention (white) at Asheville, N. C., and that the colored Baptist brother was discussed in that convention; that the two races in the South loved each other and understood each other best; that there was room enough in the South for the two races to labor together in this land of sunshine and flowers for the Master.

THE FAIRVILLE CONVENTION. The speaker made the striking point that the destinies of the two races are in a peculiar and mysterious way bound together, and when one falls, to an extent the other falls, and when one rises, to an extent the other will rise just a little higher.
