

TRIGG CO. MORTGAGE LIEN ON THE PROPERTY TO SECURE \$1,000,000 LOAN. TRUST & SAFE DEPOSIT CO. Richmond Financial Concern Advances the Money, Which Will Be Used to Enlarge and Improve the Big Shipbuilding Plant.

The second large mortgage issued by the William R. Trigg Company, shipbuilders of this city, since its organization, was filed in the chancery court today to be recorded.

The document is a lien on all property of the company in favor of the Richmond Trust and Safe Deposit Company for a loan of \$1,000,000, which is to be used in improving and enlarging the plant.

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Whereas, at said meeting of the stockholders it was further resolved that the directors of the said Trigg Company should cause to be made and executed for the aforementioned purposes nine hundred bonds each for one thousand dollars (\$1,000), numbered consecutively from 1 to 900, both inclusive, and two hundred bonds each for five hundred dollars (\$500), numbered consecutively from 901 to 1,100, both inclusive, dated the 14th day of June, A. D. 1902, payable on the 14th day of June, 1912, with interest thereon from the day of the date thereof at the rate of six per cent. per annum, clear of taxes, payable on the 14th day of the month of June and December, and both principal and interest payable at the office of the Richmond Trust and Safe Deposit Company, in the city of Richmond, in current gold coin of the United States of America, of not less than the present standard weight and fineness, with the option upon the part of the said Trigg Company to redeem said bonds at any interest period by paying therefor a premium of five per cent. in addition to the face value thereof, and with the option upon the part of the holders of the said bonds to convert said bonds at any interest period into one share of preferred stock and one share of common stock of the said Trigg Company for each one hundred dollars face value of said bonds, and should issue the said bonds from time to time at their discretion; and

Whereas, at a meeting of the board of directors held June 13, A. D. 1902, it was resolved in pursuance of the resolutions of the stockholders and for the purpose of carrying the same into effect that the president and vice-president or secretary and secretary-executive of the corporation should issue eleven hundred bonds to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), nine hundred of which bonds numbered consecutively from 1 to 900, both inclusive, shall be the sum of \$1,000 each, and two hundred of which bonds numbered from 901 to 1,100, both inclusive, shall be in the sum of \$500 each, and secure the same by a mortgage in the form approved and authorized by the said stockholders and that each and said nine hundred bonds

FATAL STORMS SOUTH AND NORTH. Peach Merchant Killed and Great Damage Done at Richmond, Ga., On the S. A. L.

COLUMBUS, GA., June 16.—A terrific wind-rain and electrical storm did considerable damage at Richmond, situated thirty-nine miles from here, on the Seaboard Air-Line, this afternoon. J. M. Hurley, a peach merchant, was instantly killed by lightning. His water pipe was peaches under a shed at the time, and his wife, who was near him, was severely shocked. The stores of Layfield & Bell, W. E. Ethridge, B. E. Mayo, T. S. Chapman, and the large brick building were unroofed, and their stocks almost ruined by wind and water.

MANY PEWS VACANT. CONGREGATION SEEK A CAUSE FOR SMALL ATTENDANCE. SERMON ON MUSIC IN HEAVEN.

ROY BROWN KILLS WM. KING IN ROANOKE YESTERDAY. A Negro Homicide With a Woman in the Case—Rev. Dr. Jas. W. Lynch Resigns.

ROANOKE, VA., June 16.—(Special)—Roy Brown, a young negro, shot and killed William King, a much-respected colored man, at the former's home, at 4 o'clock this afternoon. King had boarded Brown's mother a number of years, and was engaged to marry her daughter. The men were supposedly on the best of terms until yesterday, when Brown told King he did not want to see him with his sister in law, and that he had come to Roanoke in her company he would kill him. They were together again last night, when the Brown boy again warned King that if he did not stay away from his sister and his home he would kill him. At 4 o'clock this afternoon Brown went to his home and found King sitting at the table eating. Brown deliberately drew a revolver, placed it to King's head and fired. The bullet crashed through King's brain, killing him instantly. The murderer is a railroad brakeman, and the murderer clerks in Goldsberg's saloon. Brown has not been captured.

REV. DR. LYNCH RESIGNS. Rev. Dr. James W. Lynch, pastor of Calvary Baptist church, will offer his resignation to his congregation to-morrow night, to take effect July 1st. Dr. Lynch will return to Wake Forest, N. C., again to become pastor of the congregation he left six months ago to come to Roanoke. J. W. 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CLONBURN IN VERMONT. BARRE, VT., June 16.—In addition to great property damage caused by a cloudburst over this section late last night, five railroad men lost their lives by a freight train on the Central Vermont railroad, running into a washout at Middlesex. The dead include the conductor, engineer, fireman, and two brakemen. The train consisted of a locomotive and twelve cars. Passing through Middlesex, it was running at a fair rate of speed, when it struck a ditch washed out by a torrent of water. The locomotive leaped into the ditch, and the freight cars piled up on top of it. The trainmen were buried under the ruins.
