THE CLOSING HEAVY.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET FALLS INTO PRACTICAL STAGNATION. MORE STRIKE CONFERENCES. But They Are Without Effect in Reviv- Awaking Hope That a Settlement is at Hand-Call Money 6 Per Cent. After Going Up Again to 15.

NEW YORK, October 10.—To-day's early decline in the prices of stocks represented the retreat of operators who had bought yesterday under the inspiration of the current rumors of an imminent settlement of the coal strike. The decline carried some bear selling as an incident and a small rally at the close represented the covering by this room-trading element. The closing itself was a fact of its being the eve of the Jewish day of atonement was an incident in the growing uneasiness of the market. The disposition to close up contracts so that the market fell into practical stagnation late in the day. The market was wanted from this state of affairs that speculative operators have been unwilling to feel of resignation to waiting market, pending the relief of some stringency, or some tangible development indicating the prospect of a settlement of the coal strike.

CALL MONEY 6 PER CENT. The rate for call money fell off 1/4 per cent. in the day, but this was after a special rate had been met. The rate which had run up to 15 per cent. on the day before, was now at 14 1/4 per cent. Preliminary estimates of a favorable bank statement, coming to the receipt during the week of the report of the Federal Reserve Board, and the prospect of a strong bank statement, the banks showed no signs of changing their policy of abstention from lending their loan accommodations in the stock market. The banks evidently considered it the part of wisdom to conserve their resources to meet the interest demand.


