BOARD OF ALDERMEN CONCUR IN APPROPRIATION OF \$5,000.

REPAIR BLOODY RUN RAVINE.

The Finance Committee Authorized to Negotiate Temporary Loans of \$25,000 in Addition to Those Already Provided for, Making \$75,000 in All.

The Board of Aldermen lost an hour last night trying to get a quorum, but made up for the lost time in the quick dispatch of the business before it--concurring in the Council's appropriation of \$8,000 for the construction and repair of the Church Hill sewer--when the body was finally called to order.

The rules were suspended and the appropriation concurred in without discussion.

TO NEGOTIATE \$25,000 LOANS. Mr. James R. Gordon, of Monroe, asked that the rules be suspended in order to consider a resolution which he offered--that the Finance Committee be authorized to negotiate further temporary loans of \$25,000, as the needs of the city may require, to be liquidated out of the resources of the city for the year 1902.

The rules were suspended and the resolution unanimously adopted.

A SYRIAN TRIAL FOR A SERIOUS CRIME.

Case of Cassim Issod, Charged With Criminally Assaulting a Little Girl, in Rockingham Co.

HARRISONBURG, VA., November 26. (Special.)--The trial of a Syrian peddler named Cassim Issod, charged with assaulting a little girl, in Rockingham County, was begun in Rockingham County Court to-day.

The accused denies her statements in every particular, claiming only to have stopped at the place long enough to get a drink of water in the yard, not even entering the house, and never so much as touching the child, who handed him a tin cup at the door.

The prisoner neither speaks nor understands English, and his testimony was given through an interpreter. Half a dozen of his countrymen from different States of the Union are attending the trial, and are furnishing counsel for his defense.

The trial was unfinished when court adjourned to-night.
