SENATOR ANDERSON PRESENTS A

CAPITOL RESOLUTION.

SUM OF \$50,000 FOR ST. LOUIS

Bill Providing for Appropriation

Passed by Practically Unanimous

Voice—House Refers Campbell

Investigation Matter to Committee

on Courts of Justice.

The House of Delegates of Virginia after an hour's debate and an ineffectual attempt on the part of Mr. Boaz, chairman of the House Finance Committee, to reduce the appropriation passed by a practically unanimous vote, the Bowmar bill, appropriating the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of making a Virginia exhibit at the St. Louis World's Exposition...

The Senate session was not marked by anything exciting or even interesting, excepting that Senator Anderson offered a resolution directly affecting the repairs over until to-day. The measure provides that the entire cost of the repairs shall not come within the appropriation...

THE SENATE.

The Senate was called to order at noon by Lieutenant-Governor William H. Hunter, who offered by the Rev. Dr. J. William Jones, of the Baptist church, a prayer...

Senator Wickham, from the finance committee, reported back the bill providing a dispensary for the town of Pulaski, with the recommendation that it be sent to the committee on special petitions and resolutions...

Resolved by the senate of Virginia: 1. It is the sense of the senate that in repairing and renovating the capitol, the appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars should not be made to cover the cost of the monument to Washington...

2. In the opinion of the senate the repairs should be completed by the original design of the building by the erection of steps leading to the southern portico.

Senator Wickham said that it was proper to let the members of the senate know the nature of the resolution and that it was adopted. It was adopted, it meant that the senate chamber would be removed from its present location to the upper floors of the capitol.

The resolution as offered was laid on the table and the speaker called the Elected Judge Grinnan.

The senate at 12:35 went into the election of judge of the chancery court of the city of Richmond. Senator Anderson nominated Daniel Grinnan, who is at present discharging the duties of the position, having been appointed by Governor Montague. Judge Grinnan received every vote cast.

The house of delegates of Virginia convened at noon, Speaker Ryan presiding. There was no prayer and the journal was not read.

Mr. Southall, from the committee for courts of justice, reported to the house the resolution heretofore printed, recommending the appointment of a special committee of five members of the house to investigate and report upon the case...

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of Judge Clarence J. Campbell, of Amherst, against whom charges have been filed by members of the bars of the county of Amherst and the city of Lynchburg. Mr. Cummings, of Elizabeth City county, introduced a substitute for the committee resolution, which provided that the committee for courts of justice be authorized and empowered to investigate the case.

Mr. Cummings, who is not a member of the committee for courts of justice, speaking for the substitute, argued that it would be a reflection upon that committee from the courts of justice committee to violate of the precedents of the house procedure to do. He argued that it was unfair to the speaker to thrust upon him the responsibility to name this special committee.

ADJUSTMENT OF STATUTES. The following was read a third time and ordered to be printed: To facilitate the committees of the general assembly in their work of adjusting the general statutes to the new constitution, by providing for the collection, classification and placing in convenient form of each committee such general statutes as pertain to the subjects assigned to it.

MR. BOAZ'S OPPOSES. Mr. Boaz, of Albemarle, chairman of the committee on finance, offered and advocated an amendment reducing the appropriation to \$25,000, and quoted figures of appropriations already made and those in prospect, and on the showing of the State's finances he declared that it would be unsafe to increase the reduced rate of taxation provided by the new constitution.

MR. KEYVELL'S APPEAL FOR BILL. Mr. Kelley, of Richmond, in an eloquent appeal for the bill, closed the debate. He urged the house either to vote down the amendment or to defeat the bill, referring to the pitifully poor exhibition of the State at Chicago, and the humiliation of Virginians at the parsimony which made it possible.

MR. MURRELL'S BEDFORD. Mr. Murrell, of Bedford, in an earnest speech, advocated the appropriation, and in doing so showed that an adequate exhibit could not be made with a sum less than \$50,000.
