ORGANIZATION FOR BANKS.

It Will Doubtless Be Reappointed—Nichols to Have Postoffice—Under Ruling Made by the Attorney-General, Carney, and West Are Eliminated from Contest.

WASHINGTON, D. C., December 23.—(Special.)—The collectorship of customs at Norfolk was the subject of a long interview at the Treasury Department to-day.

National Committeeman Bowden having come on here and met Park Agnew for a conference with Secretary Shaw. They spent some time with the Secretary, discussing the Norfolk collectorship. They have formally recommended the reappointment of Major R. G. Banks, the present collector, and it is understood he will probably be named to the Presidency by Secretary Shaw.

Major Banks' term does not expire until a date in January, and so there is to be no haste about pressing the matter. The suggestion that J. Hampton Hope is to be put forward for the position is frequently heard here, but it is stated by an official authority that Mr. Hope would not permit consideration of his name unless it should be presented by Messrs. Agnew and Bowden, in the regular way.
