MAINTAIN STABILITY

President Sends Message on Money Question.

TRADE MUCH AFFECTED

Asks that Executive Be Given Authority to Lead Support of Government to Plan Proposed by China and Mexico.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, January 29.—President Roosevelt to-day sent the following message to Congress:

"I transmit herewith a report from the Secretary of State with accompanying notes from the Mexican ambassador and the Chinese chargé d'affaires ad interim, which seeks the co-operation of the United States in such measures as will tend to restore and maintain a fixed relationship between the moneys of the gold standard countries and the silver using countries. I recommend that the Executive be given sufficient powers to lend the support of the United States in such manner and to such degree as may seem expedient to the purposes of the two agreements."

"THEODORE ROOSEVELT."

The message was referred to the Committee on Finance.

NO Bimetallism.

In his communication Secretary Hay says:

"It is not asked that the United States modify its monetary system, and it is distinctly disavowed that any movement is contemplated for the restoration of an ornamental use of the silver. The opinion is expressed, however, by the representatives of both governments that consultation between the United States, European powers having dependencies in the Orient and the independent countries where silver is the general use, may result in the adoption of a monetary system which will prevent the great fluctuations in exchange which now occur in trade with the silver-using countries. It is pointed out that a partial solution has been proposed in the United States in a bill now pending in the Senate in regard to the Philippine Islands—great benefits will follow to the trade of the world by making easier the access of the products of the manufacturing nations to the markets of China and the other silver-using countries. The consideration of this subject may have an important bearing also on the payment of the indemnity due by China to certain European powers and by the United States by enabling the Chinese empire to put her monetary system upon a basis which will make it possible for her to meet these payments in a manner satisfactory to all the powers."

AFFECTS TRADE.

The memorandum submitted by China

and Mexico are practically identical. The Chinese note can be taken as typical of Mexico's. It says that the serious results which are threatened by the recent fluctuations in the value of silver bullion to the commerce of both of gold and silver standard countries have induced the Chinese Imperial Government, acting in concert with the Mexican Government, to ask the co-operation of the United States in seeking a remedy of these conditions for the mutual benefit of all concerned. It is pointed out that trade stability between the United States, a gold country, and China, a silver country, is destroyed by a variation of twenty per cent. in one year in the price of silver bullion, as happened last year. The memorandum urges that stability in this respect is as important to gold using as to silver using countries. It shows that the silver using countries imported in 1907, almost exclusively from gold standard countries, the value of \$14,625,323, excluding British India and several silver countries in South America which might be brought into an agreement to maintain stability. It is further pointed out that the largest amount of the trade, namely, \$19,573,242 went to China. This trade, it is declared, is now threatened with a decline, the limit of which no one can foresee. The heavy indemnity imposed by certain other powers on the Chinese Government has further depressed silver prices and has tended to reduce materially the export trade to China from the United States and Europe. This trade from the United States is said to have increased greatly within twelve years, and is now but a slight measure of what it might become with stable currency.

COUNTESS ARRESTED

Charged With Pretending to Have Borne a Son and Heir.

(By Associated Press.)

BERLIN, January 29.—Countess Isabella Westerska Kwieck, belonging to a rich aristocratic Polish family, has been arrested by the criminal police here on the charge of pretending to have borne a son six years ago and presenting him as the heir to an estate at Wroblewo (Province of Posen), consisting of 10,000 acres and having a yearly rental roll totaling \$15,000.

Count Miszlav Kwiecki, a member of the Prussian House of Lords, and his son, Count Hector Kwiecki, a member of the Reichstag, as next of kin, contested the legitimacy of the Countess's son two years ago, and after a sensational trial at Posen she was acquitted. The Countess and the Count, her husband, continued living quietly on the Polish estate, until the trial, spending the winters in fashionable Berlin society. The suspicions regarding the legitimacy of the Countess's child continued, however, and the prosecuting attorney, continuing his investigation, obtained fresh testimony through the police examination of a woman who bore a child at the time the son of the Countess is said to have been born, and the arrest of the Countess followed.
