

HEROES ARE REMEMBERED

Oakwood-Memorial Day Fully Celebrated.

FITZ LEE'S FINE SPEECH

Tender Tribute to the Brave Men Who Fell in a Sacred Cause—Graves Strewn With Flowers by Fair Women—Fine Music.

Fanned by the gentle breeze of the spring-time, inspired by the soft strains of martial music and in the presence of a vast throng of fair women and brave men delicate hands scattered beautiful flowers upon the graves of the Confederate dead who sleep in beautiful Oakwood yesterday afternoon.

General Fitzhugh Lee was orator of the day, and he made a speech full of pathos and eloquence which caused the hearts of the highest pitch of enthusiasm.

In the open space in front were a hundred veterans from the Soldiers' Home, and behind them sat members of Lee and Meade's camps.

The stand upon which the exercises were held was appropriately decorated, and in front of the orator was a beautiful wreath of roses, sent by the Hollywood Memorial Association.

The line of march formed at St. John's Church at 4 o'clock, and it was nearly 5 before the speaking began.

The parade was led by Mr. W. H. Sherwin, chief marshal, and several aides, and following close behind was the Seventy-first Regiment, commanded by Major Chas. O. Saville.

Then came the carriages bearing the dignitaries of the nation and ladies of the two memorial associations.

On the stand, besides those who took part in the exercises, were Governor and Mrs. Montague, Colonels Cabell, Harwood and the Hon. J. M. W. McKim, and Mrs. Little Laine Montague, dressed in the regulation uniform of his father's staff.

Rev. James P. Smith presided and prayer was offered by Dr. W. A. Cooper, of St. James' Methodist Episcopal Church. Then the choir rendered "March, My Country to Thee," and Dr. Smith, in a most complimentary speech, presented General Lee.

General Lee was in fine trim and made good his reputation as a soldier, which a salute was fired by the Howitzers and the regiment.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. R. A. Goodwin, of St. John's.

General Lee commenced his address with a graceful tribute to the women of the South, and declared that he favored the early erection of a monument to commemorate their noble labors.

He then produced some interesting statistics to show the great odds against which the South struggled, and finally launched into a comparison of Southern general with that of the North.

Among the comparisons was that of Napoleon with Jackson, and after paying high tribute to the former, he spoke thus of the latter: "Look upon the man who walked to Washington from Lewis county, Va., and appeared before John Tyler, in his plain home-spun suit with leathern saddle bags upon his shoulders, asking for a cadetship at the United States Military Academy at West Point?"

He was the awkward, ungainly youth who wrote in his private books of m-m-x-x-x-x may be what you would like to be." He was the young officer of artillery in the United States Army, who stood so indifferent to shot and shell at Chaluppeuse, in 1847, and who, figuratively speaking, put the foot of the enemy in the City of Mexico, when he stepped in front of the troops appalled by the terrific fire, and said: "See my men, there is no danger, follow me. At first it was thought that the two workmen on the interior of the house were killed under the debris and for a time great excitement prevailed. When they discovered themselves after their fright, however, the two found that they were none the worse for the experience.

The house left standing and after a little the two black axes appeared at the upper windows. It was with a mind-reviving cheer that those below hoisted ladders down which the two darkies crawled to safety. Their names are Robert Johnson and Robert Nelson.

NARROW ESCAPES. In the episcopal residence the greatest confusion existed for some time following the explosion. The debris was torn through the wall and piled up two or three tons of them in the hall.

The window at the end of the lower hall was torn out or practically so and the one immediately above survived. Bishop Van de Vyver, father Bowler, vicar-general of the diocese, Father Magri, and Mrs. Hopkins, the housekeeper, were all within at the time.
