

NONE NAMED BY ALUMNI

Richmond Chapter Voiceless on University Presidency.

CONFIDENCE IN THE BOARD

Lauds Action of Visitors in Placing Salary of Presidency at Figure Worth an Able Educator and the High Position—Large Attendance

The Richmond Chapter of Alumni of the University of Virginia decided yesterday afternoon not to recommend to the Board of Visitors any one for the presidency of the institution, expressing by resolution entire confidence in the board and offering it the aid of the chapter in any way possible.

The attendance was the largest for a long time. Many of the best known men in Richmond were present, and they met in 6:30 sharp in the audience room of the Chamber of Commerce. But they were in session hardly more than fifteen minutes. Mr. Wyndham R. Meredith offered resolutions, printed here, which were adopted without discussion or opposition:

Resolved: That at this its first meeting since the enactment of the law creating the office of president of the University of Virginia, the Richmond Chapter of the Alumni of that institution desire to record its approval of the action of the Board of Visitors thereunder in making the salary of the president commensurate with the dignity of the office, and such as an educator worthy to fill the place should receive.

Resolved: That the first step towards securing the proper man to fill the office of president of the University of Virginia is to secure the proper man who in character, training, achievements and scholarship will best fulfill the duties of the office and realize the hope of her devoted sons.

Resolved further: That it is the sense of this meeting that we should not undertake to recommend to the Board of Visitors any individual as a proper person for the first president of our University, but in response to expressions from the Board of Visitors we stand ready, as individuals, to render the board any assistance in our power, or to secure any information as to any particular person that they may desire, earnestly praying that the result of their deliberations may return to the future prosperity of our chief institution of learning and to its increased usefulness to American as well as Southern education and culture.

A motion was carried to give to the Executive Committee the power of appointing the recipient of the privileges of the chapter's scholarship. President McGuire was requested to appoint a committee of seven to attend the finals of the University as the representatives of the chapter.

Present: McGuire was in the chair and Mr. Hunsdon Cary was at the desk as secretary.

MR. MORGAN GONE

Reception Tendered Him Last Night. Rev. R. G. Frank May Be Called.

Mr. Morgan and his family, with the exception of his two sons, who are students at Richmond College, left yesterday for their new home, Park, Ky., where he will resume the duties of his pastorate. During his residence in this city Mr. Morgan has made many friends among all denominations, and he has become one of the most popular ministers in the city. The church has prospered greatly under his pastorate.

Rev. Robert Graham Frank, of Philadelphia, has accepted an invitation to preach to the pastorate. It is presumed that the congregation after hearing him will call for the pastor they desire, he may be called by them.

Interesting Tests Going on at the Farm in Charlotte.

Commissioner of Agriculture Koerner has just returned from the State test farm in Charlotte county, where he has been for several days directing the experiments in progress there and noting the condition of the crops. During the season just begun tests will be made in the cultivation of bright and dark leaf tobaccos with different kinds of fertilizers in which varying quantities of nitrogen, potash and phosphoric acid are used with a view to ascertaining what fertilizers are best adapted to the growing of the varieties of tobacco raised in this State.
