

STRAKE IN PETERSBURG

Bus Lines as Well as Car Lines in Operation.

NEITHER ARE PATRONIZED

Men Will Not Be Paid Until They Turn in Their Badges and Buttons—The Almshouse Superintendent is Asked to Resign.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) PETERSBURG, Va., June 19.—There are now two transportation lines in Petersburg, a street railway and a union trolley line. Neither carries many passengers, for the people seem to be disposed to walk till the matter is settled.

There has been no demonstration of any kind in the city, and the striking street car men continue to act in a most commendable manner. Cars are operated by the company on the Washington Street and Fernside Park lines, but no attempt has been made to run them on the other lines. No police protection has been furnished, and the regular service makes the regular scheduled runs.

A committee from the men called at the office of the company to-day to ask if the men would receive what is due them, this being the regular pay day.

Superintendent Harvill advised them that his instructions are not to pay the men until they return their badges and buttons.

REUNION AT THE CRATER. The suggestion of Colonel William H. Stewart, the ranking field colonel, that the surviving members of Mahona's brigade who participated in the battle of the crater hold a reunion at the crater, near this city, is creating considerable interest among the survivors in Petersburg.

There are many in this city who participated in this famous fight, and the members of A. P. Hill Camp will lend their aid in the matter of the reunion of the surviving participants.

It is not, of course, at the time known. The suggestion was made to-day by one of the members of the brigade that it would doubtless be a splendid opportunity for a sham battle at the crater, which was fought a few decades ago, a battle in all its realistic fury was fought. The idea of the old soldier making this suggestion is that the sham forces represent the Confederate and the Federal forces, and occupy the positions occupied by these two contending forces at the time the battle was fought.

In the suit of J. H. Pettus against the Southside Railway and Development Company for \$3,000 damages, caused in falling from a street car in this city, the jury rendered a verdict of \$1,853 for the plaintiff. The testimony of Mr. Pettus was that he requested the conductor to stop at Guarantee Street, and that when the car slowed down and stopped from his seat and just gotten down on the car and knocking him to the street.
