

ODELL TO THE RESCUE

Replies to Part of David B. Hill's Speech.

SHOWS SOME ILL-TEMPER

Unrequited Political Ambition, He Thinks, Has Made Senator Hill Look on Black Side of Everyone and Everything.

(By Associated Press.) ALBANY, N. Y., August 25.—Governor Odell, in an address at the picnic of the Pioneers' Association of Livingston county, at Genesee, N. Y., to-day turned his attention to that part of former Governor David B. Hill's address last week at Olato Beach, N. Y., in which Mr. Hill referred to "spectacularism" and "egomania."

THE NOMINATIONS MADE UP TO DATE

Standard-Bearers Chosen in the Various State Districts.

Nominations for the House and Senate are proceeding steadily and already about forty have been made, most of them being declared the nominees by the county and City Committee without the formality of a primary. In many of the others the primaries are to be held or the nominees to be proclaimed in the event that no opposition develops, during the next fortnight. Since the last election the State has been redistricted, making some changes in the representation necessary.

ATTEMPT MADE TO EFFECT A LANDING

TWO WOMEN DROWNED DURING A FIERCE GALE

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—In a gale this afternoon two women lost their lives in Jamaica Bay. They were Mrs. John Holm and her sister, Miss Regina Busnesson of Brooklyn. They were sailing in a cat boat with Mr. Holm, and the boat upset about half past five. The women were taken from the water by a party in a steam launch, but they died without regaining consciousness.
