### Items of Interest From the Various Lines.

## A VERY LARGE EXCURSION

#### Hundreds Go Down to Buckroe Beach Marriage of Miss Fuller Announced. New Quarters for the Old Dominion.

The statement for the third week of August, just issued by the comptroller of the Seaboard Air Line Railway, shows the estimated gross earnings to be \$240,470, compared with \$238,000 for the corresponding week last year, an increase of \$2,470 for the week of 1903. Total earnings for the month to date, \$1,270,555, compared with \$1,108,210 for the same period of last year, an increase of \$162,345. Estimated gross earnings from July 1st, 1903, to August 25th, 1903, \$3,158,401, compared with \$2,937,070, an increase of \$221,331.

### VERY LARGE EXCURSION.

The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway yesterday carried an excursion of 650 persons from this city and points along the peninsula division of the road to Buckroe Beach. Buckroe has grown wonderfully during the season as an objective point of excursion parties, the Chesapeake and Ohio having hauled thousands to the popular bay shore resort.

The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway is arranging to run an excursion from this city to Buckroe Beach to-day, under the auspices of the Broadus Memorial Sunday school. The train will consist of five or six coaches. This will be a fine opportunity to enjoy an outing to the seashore at a time when sea breezes are much in demand.
