

SORGHUM AS FORAGE CROP

A Pickle Factory to be Established on the Northern Neck.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) HEATHS VILLAGE, VA., June 11.—The stock raisers of this section are trying to introduce sorghum as a forage crop into the Northern Neck. This crop has been tried in several of the Western States and as a feed for cattle has been pronounced unqualifiedly successful.

The Lumeau Vinegar and Pickle Company of Baltimore, will soon erect a pickle factory at Tiper's Wharf, near Wicomico. This will be the first factory of the kind in Northumberland county. The industry in the Northern Neck, and is said to pay better than the tomato canneries.

A Chicago physician, telegraphing the Chicago Tribune from Atlantic City, says: The second day's session of the various sectional meetings of the American Medical Association produced a symposium of expert opinions on subjects that are of acute interest to the lay mind. The "sacrospinous life" and its effects upon the human system received a thorough discussion from many points of view.

FOO QUICK WITH THE KNIFE. Appendicitis was discussed in different sections and the prevailing opinion seemed to be that the knife was resorted to too quickly in many cases. Dr. L. C. Kline, of Philadelphia, commenting on the subject, said the tendency today was to treat the disease too much surgically and too little medicinally. "We have been living in an age of operations," said Dr. Kline, "and we have lost sight in a measure of less violent methods."

THE EDUCATION OF GIRLS. In the continuation of the discussion of higher education of girls one doctor said: "Eliminate Latin and Greek mythology, and the foreign languages from the studies and permit the girls to have more hours of recreation in the shelter of the advocates of our grandfathers, who were doctors in bygone periods. These studies are not objected to, but give our girls plenty of outdoor exercise. This will produce the highest and best type of womanhood. A happy compromise might thus be drawn or inferred, that study and physical exercise be made twin elements of the girls' curriculum, with advantage to the future mothers of the Anglo-Saxon race."
