Will Not Appear. "A party may indulge in self-congratulations when it has effectively defended the people in their daily life from the rapacity of trusts and combinations, which thrive as private enterprises, and which grow fast by their control of the cost of living, they cause the homes of our land to grow lean; but the people will hardly approve the vociferous pride which claims that a successful attack upon the merger of the stock of certain competing railroads has rescued them from their oppressors.

Burdens the Consumer. "This item of the account will not be paid over without a reference to the platform statement that the tariff is a cardinal policy of the Republican party, not without noting the declaration of the candidate standing on this platform, that the protective tariff policy ought now to be considered as definitely established.

A Serious Situation. "Now this deficiency in receipts presents a serious situation. Either the expenses must be cut down—and the present administration is in effect that it does not propose to do—or the tariff must provide some other method of raising the needed money.

Go Hand in Hand. "With these tendencies and these burdens in mind, they will ask the party professing the anxiety to restrain or destroy the tariff combinations, why it has not established a protective tariff policy which, in addition to its other sins, contributes to a situation that permits a combination or monopoly to sell abroad articles of our manufacture at lower prices than they receive from our own citizens at home.

Andrew Jackson's View. "Our administrative officials should return once more to those sound principles which formerly were in operation; principles which prompted that portion of President Jackson's inaugural address, which I quote in closing, and to which I beg your careful attention.

Imperialism Denounced. "When the platform here is made that in the Philippines we have established a government, established order and given life and property a security never known before, the confession is suppressed was no more than the crushing aid of resistance to the army of the United States while engaged in the subjugation of a people thousands of miles from our shores, when an incident of our own undertaken by us in aid of these struggling for liberty and independence in another quarter, had put within our power and the people will ask under what sanction was this subjugation entered upon by a nation pledged to the doctrine that it has no right of government over a people who are not its own, and they will deny that imperialism and our forcible rule of foreign power have any place among the purposes of our national life.

National Honor Involved. "When credit is claimed for securing a route for a long-desired international waterway, it will not be in a carrying-

spirit that the people will look at the incidents accompanying the achievements. They do not undervalue the object pursued, but they keenly appreciate the importance and value of our national honor, our national good name, and above all, our national morality. Not even the great worth of the thing accomplished will close the eyes of thoughtful Americans to the fact that in reaching this result we have exhibited such international ruthlessness and such selfish international immorality as have justly debilitated our reputation for good faith, and established a precedent which, in time to come, may be invoked to justify the most startling and reprehensible abandonment of the high ideals which have made us an example of the best civilization—a people, happy as we are intelligently, free, and generous, are scrupulously just, and everywhere trusted and honored as we undeniably follow in the way of upright and virtuous.

Eloquent Peroration. "I have ventured to suggest the misleading purpose of the vainglorious claims made by a party organization which seeks a continuance of political control, and to the intelligent and patriotic vigilance which the exploitation of these claims involves. It is surely not narrow partisanship which prompts me to entreat my countrymen to hold fast and sure their independence of thought and their courage in judgment; nor do I speak in a tone of partisanship, when I beg them to remember that the true greatness and glory of our nation cannot safely rest upon wealth which finds its way to the few at the expense of the many, nor upon such material success as contaminates the purity of aims the potency of patriotic sentiment, nor upon a disregard of our national mission and intent; nor upon achievements that put in question our national morality. Above all, greater than all, guarding and protecting all and fostering everything that American patriotism should covet, are the services and devotion to country of a sincere people who believe, that, if their government is preserved in its simplicity and defended against perversion, its blessings of happiness, contentment and true prosperity will in bounteous measure visit every corner of our land."

KEY PEDDLER SUES MAYOR. Russian Wants Damages for Alleged False Accusations. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) NORFOLK, October 21.—Mayor James G. Riddick and Police Chief M. J. Velles were made defendants in two suits for \$4,000 each, instituted to-day by Julius Ochotokovsky, a Russian key peddler. RINGING SPEECHES. Senator Martin and Judge Rhea in the South-west. MASTERLY DISCUSSIONS. Courtroom at Jonesville Crowded to Hear Them—Escorted From Station, Four Miles. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) JONESVILLE, Va., Oct. 21.—Senator Martin and ex-Congressman W. F. Ithca addressed a large, enthusiastic and attentive audience at the Courthouse here to-day.

Richmond and the Convention. A writer in the Boston Transcript says: General satisfaction is felt at the decision of the convention to hold its session of 1907 in Richmond, Va., for the first time since the convention of 1860, the thirtieth anniversary of the establishment of the Anglican communion in the Western Hemisphere. This is a most fitting and fitting settlement in America, as it is still in existence, and thus considerably antedates any other organization of the kind in the world. It is a fitting monument to the many other points of historic interest in Richmond, as it is the birthplace of the Virginia House of Burgesses, where the first church division, which led to the formation of the Episcopal Church in America, was held. The convention will be held in the city of Philadelphia, where the first church division was held, and from which he made the speech containing the famous words, "Give me liberty or give me death." From the point of view of special interest will attach to the convention of 1907, since it will be the first general convention of the church since the Civil War. When the convention assembles in Richmond it will be as the convention of a church which has been through a long and hard struggle. While the conflict divided Presbyterians, Methodists and other religious bodies into Northern and Southern divisions, which were retained to this day, it left the Episcopal Church an organic whole. True, none of the Southern bishops came to the convention, but the church was re-organized in 1862, but when the war had ended they resumed their places, largely through the example and leadership of Bishop Doane of North Carolina. He attended the convention held in Philadelphia, and by his wisdom and forbearance contributed largely to the restoration of cordial relations. During the session a bishop from a Northern diocese offered a resolution expressing the gratitude of the convention "for union to the country and peace in the world." Feeling ran high. It was a critical moment in the history of the church. Had the resolution been carried, in all human probability it would have been a rupture. But Bishop Atkinson, with rare tact and patience, explained why he and some of his brethren could not accept of God, at that moment, at least, for "union to the country." They were grateful for "peace in the country and in the world," but they were not ready to form the resolution was carried, and the organic unity of the church was preserved.
