Most women know that it is too necessary to be relegated to the past: Their practicability and wide range, in design and quality, insures for them continued popularity and so long as the tailor-made suits are fashionable the clever woman will limit her blouses only by the length of her purse strings, or the extent of her ingenuity.

In the model shown here, a triumph has been achieved in the omission of the shoulder seam, thus carrying out the idea of long sloping shoulder as nothing else will do. The fullness in the sleeve is laid in a box-pleat, which extends up over the shoulder into the collar. There it may be fastened by buttons or if the waist is of silk, by buckles or fancy "baby pins." The fancy yoke and cuffs add not a little to the smart design, although the dress is in the plain French style, and the waist, like all the newer styles, is finished by a poplin.

Mercerized cottons and silks are suitable for shirt-waists, although the style is one that may be followed in making a costume of any of the new dress weaves.
