MIDNIGHT RIDE THROUGH RIVER

But Young Man Reached Richmond and Elopel With Willing Girl.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—With practically no baggage and with only the clothes they wore, Harold Wood MacConnell and his bride, who was Miss Jane W. Brown, arrived in New York to-night, after an elopement from their home in Virginia, which included a midnight ride on horseback to elude parental vigilance, a swim across a swollen Southern stream and an appeal to the bride's parents for forgiveness for doing what her forefathers did for four generations back.

The young persons were engaged to be married with the consent of their parents until a month ago, when the bride's father ordered the engagement broken, and took his daughter to Richmond. Every attempt they made to meet their parents was frustrated by their parents until "Bert" Cornell, a friend of MacConnell, appeared. Cornell, who was visiting from Montclair, was sent to Richmond to arrange with the girl, who was perfectly willing, and on Saturday night, the elopement took place.

MacConnell and Cornell at midnight quietly paddled two horses, rode away from Peekahonts, until they were stopped by the Bluefield River, ice-filled and swollen to a torrent. MacConnell plunged in and after a hard swim finally emerged on the other side, his companion immediately behind him, both almost dead. A railroad station was their first point of rest.

Reaching there, Cornell went to the girl's home, and with a pretext of wishing to be shown to a hospital, got her from her mother and took her to MacConnell. All three then boarded a train for Washington, where MacConnell and Miss Browning were met by the Rev. Richard B. Williams. On reaching New York yesterday they at once sent home for forgiveness and clothes, but up to a late hour had received neither.

TRAIN CRASHES INTO LANDBLIDE; 1 KILLED

(By Associated Press.) LOS ANGELES, CAL., Feb. 21.—The first section of north-bound Southern Pacific passenger train No. 9, on the coast line, was wrecked to-day thirty-five miles north of Santa Barbara. The train crashed into a landslide on a curve and a net of iron cables was struck. One man was killed, several of the train crew seriously hurt and eight or ten of the passengers more or less injured. The man who was killed was Wm. Torres, of San Francisco, reportedly a well-known actor in the motion picture business. He was riding on the engine, assisting in testing a new appliance. His body was horribly mutilated.
