

## JERUSALEM, THE GOLDEN!

Written by BERNARD of Cluny. Translated by J. M. NEALE.

Bernard of Cluny was a Benedictine monk and a native of Mordax. He was born about 1100, and died fifty-six years later. He was a member of the Benedictine monastery at Cluny under Peter the Venerable. He is best known as the author of three hymns included in almost every English collection: "Jerusalem, the Golden," "For Thee, O Dear, Dear Country," and "The World is Very Evil." These hymns are a part of his 2,000 line poem, "De Contemptu Mundi," translated by J. M. Neale.

With milk and honey blest;  
Beneath thy contemplation  
Sink heart and voice oppress.  
I know not, oh! I know not,  
What joys await us there!  
What radiance of glory,  
What bliss beyond compare!

They stand, those halls of Zion,
