JAPAN OBJECTS TO PARIS FOR MEETING

(By Associated Press.) TOKIO, June 14.—The report of the Japanese minister at Washington, telling of his interviews with President Roosevelt and announcing the proposal that the peace plenipotentiaries of Russia and Japan meet in Paris and the appointment of M. Nelidoff, the Russian plenipotentiary, was received to-day.

REPORTS OF SHARP FIGHTING RECEIVED

(By Associated Press.) ST. PETERSBURG, June 14.—In a dispatch to the Emperor, dated June 13th, General Linowich says that the Russians, after a fight June 11th, occupied the villages of Syong Toy, Chiffi Pou and Chakhezi. The same day another detachment approached the mines near Chakhezi. A Japanese company evacuated the mines and retired southwest.

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK BY DNEPER

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, June 14.—A considerable stir has been created in shipping circles, as result of the sinking of the British steamer St. Kilda by the Russian auxiliary cruiser Dneper in the China Sea. The Foreign Office has been bombarded with telegrams from the owners of the ship, urging that action in the matter be taken.

GOING FROM BAD TO WORSE, HE SAYS

M. Witte, President of Council of Ministers, Gives Out Sensational Interview.

(By Associated Press.) ST. PETERSBURG, June 14.—The Slovo this morning published a remarkably sensational interview, filled with the gloomiest forebodings, with M. Witte, president of the committee of ministers. The Russian statesman is not mentioned, but the veil of his identity can be pierced by the veriest tyro. He evidently spoke with the profound conviction that the affairs of state are going from bad to worse, and under personal irritation produced by the intrigues which compel him to sit idle during the present crisis.
