With the spit-ball breaking correctly for him, Leake was availing yesterday afternoon, and the Browns dropped a game to Manchester. Score, 10 to 0.

Three scratch hits and a clean single were allowed by the twirler for the Manchester aggregation, while Hulcher and Mendes dished thirteen whacks out, and each whack amounted to a run and a fraction. It was the first time this season that the Browns' batting has been shut out. Only once during the game was there any probability of their scoring and Leake proved the wizard at the plate.

Meades was batted hard and retired at the end of the fourth inning, when twelve runs had crossed the plate against him. Hulcher, in the fifth, pitched a ball artist and mean-drop-pitcher. It was too late for Hulcher to do any good and six runs were made while he occupied the mound. In the sixth, Leake sent two men around the bases, drove three around in the second, drew a blank in the third and with four singles and a two-bagger, finished off the game with two errors chalked seven runs on the board. And then not satisfied with this lead, the team from the south bank of the James piled up three more in the fifth and one in the sixth.

Until the sixth inning Leake had not been hit. Two of the hits recorded against him might have been held, yet they were not. One of the other hits was a lucky one, just over the head of an in-fielder.
