

# THE LEAGUES' SESSION ENDS

Resolutions on Many Important Subjects Adopted By the Convention.

## SMOOT, OF UTAH, CONDEMNED

A Strong Demand Made for Uniform Divorce Laws—Virginia Minister Speaks.

(From Our Special Correspondent.) DENVER, COLO., July 10.—Sunday night closed the seventh international convention of the Epworth League, by many of the leaders considered the most epoch-making conference in the history of the young people's movement. All of the pieces of meetings were crowded and each church claimed the best sermons, the best sermons. The two sermons that one hears the most about and which seemed to make the most profound impression were preached by Bishops Galway and Warren.

I had the privilege of hearing Bishop Warren, his subject being "The Perfect Brotherhood of Christ." It was a charming sermon, preached with the greatest ease of manner and yet with a most masterful grip on the subject.

Pledges Themselves. The closing movements at every service held last night were open-air consecration service and thousands of young men and women pledged for more devoted service to Christ. So impressive were some of the meetings and filled with the manifest presence of God that a number of young people were won for Christ. Bishop Warren said yesterday in private conversation:

"I think the young people of Methodism after this conference will be up and doing for Christ."

One of the most interesting and enthusiastic moments of the conference was when the beautiful banner was awarded to the Epworth Leagues of Illinois, for bringing the greatest number of delegates to the conference.

Virginia Minister Speaks. Out of the 1,000 present, Illinois led 1,700. Iowa came second with 1,500. The friendly contest, Rev. W. B. Beauchamp, of Newport News, Va., talked on "Now is the Accepted Time." He said that he had hoped that this might be an epoch-making conference in the hearts of the young people.

It cannot be made such by the eloquence of the speakers unless in this hour we get into our hearts the great motto, "I am for Christ, and Christ for all." Now is the accepted hour. If we believe this, if it becomes a living reality in our hearts, then this will have been the kind of a conference that is expected upon the Epworth League of Methodism. It is a question of God and the Methodist Church to-day. If we can save and hold our young people, we can save the world.

The Revival Spirit. The revival spirit seems to be reaching here and there. Shall the Epworth League, with its fourteen years of training, be able to meet this opportunity? It is essential that every one takes part in this great tidal wave of revival. Every man walking with man in Christ. We must love men and women for Jesus' sake, and with the kind of love that makes itself known.

Protest against the seating of Reed Enoch, senator from Utah, on the resolution created the wildest enthusiasm. Persistent opposition to army candidates. Uniform divorce laws demanded. Commendation and approval of the Hopkin-Duffey bill. Resolutions of sympathy for Bishop Joyce and family.

The oratorio of Elijah was rendered again to-night. The Episcopal Church by a chorus of 250 voices and many remained to hear it.

Tuesday at 10 P. M. there will be a rally of the Southern delegates at the Southern Methodist Church in Colorado Springs, and speeches by various visiting delegates.

Wednesday most of the delegates will be heading homeward; a few of us will go to Portland and the Pacific coast. The tempo of the convention has been personal endeavor to lead men to Christ.

W. B. B. IS SEIZED BY BANDITS AND RANSOM SECURED (By Associated Press.)

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 10.—Julian Cendoya, a wealthy American banker and agent of the Ward Line, while dining with his family last night at his home, across the bay, was attacked by a band of bandits who covered the members of the family with firearms and searched the house. The bandits presented a written demand for \$30,000, and seized Mr. Cendoya as a hostage until the amount should be paid. After a long struggle, Mr. Cendoya agreed to pay \$2,000, and the bandits withdrew. This morning Mr. Cendoya came to the city and secured the money, which he turned over to the bandits at the rendezvous in the bay.

According to reports, the bandits are all Spaniards and desperate looking.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., July 10.—Mrs. Charles Gray, who was formerly Mrs. Amanda Monks, a famous Confederate spy during the Civil War, was drowned near Santa Cruz as the result of a runaway accident caused by an automobile.

The horse driven by Mrs. Gray and her husband was frightened by the automobile and backed off a bridge a mile out.

ARREST PINK FULTON. Wanted for Murder of Boy Convict By Whipping.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) WASHINGTON, D. C., July 10.—Sheriff Alpaugh is in possession of a telegram from an officer at North Fork, W. Va., stating that he has in jail at that place Pink Fulton, the man who is wanted here on the charge of whipping a boy convict named Rand Hart to death five years ago, when Pink Fulton was guard on the county roads.

If the man arrested proves to be Fulton, he will be brought back and tried for his life, a grand jury having returned a true bill for murder against him shortly after he ran away.

The county commission this afternoon revoked the order made last Monday, instructing Sheriff Alpaugh to arrange for a public hanging of J. W. Hammons, convicted of killing his wife. The execution will be in the county jail, and will be held in a few days.

AN ENGINEER'S DEATH. Duty the Strongest Emotion During His Expiring Moments.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) ASHVILLE, N. C., July 10.—I. N. Candler, an engineer in the employ of the Southern Railway, was fatally injured at Black Mountain, near this city, yesterday morning, while engaged in coupling cars. His head was thrown violently against a bumper by a sudden movement of the cars, and the base of his skull was crushed.

The actions of the man while in a dying condition were remarkable. While lying on the ground, he called out to his wife, who had been with him, and he became worried about the time that he was being lost on the run, and drew his watch from his pocket. He said: "Noting that it was almost run down, he wound it during the last moments of consciousness."

He was removed to this city in the afternoon, dying almost as soon as the hospital was reached.

# GOVERNOR GLENN NAMES DIRECTORS

The Plea of Insanity Will Be Presented for Bynum.

## TO BANQUET ROOSEVELT

A Warm Fight on Question of Dispensary or High License.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) RALEIGH, N. C., July 10.—Governor Glenn telegraphed from Atlantic City to-day to his private secretary, in the executive office here, to issue commissions to the following citizens as directors of the North Carolina Railroad: W. M. Williams, Newton; Hugh G. Chatham, Elkin; S. C. Penn, Reidsville; L. Banks Holt, Graham; Thomas H. Vanderford, Salisbury; John W. Lambert, Salisbury; W. T. Brown, Winston-Salem, and Allen J. Roffin, Hillsboro. The first four named are reappointed from the old board.

Those retiring from the board are L. M. Michael, Greensboro; George P. Pell, Winston-Salem; Dr. V. E. Turner, Raleigh, and C. M. Cooke, Wilmington. There were 136 applicants for appointment on the new board.

The Wake county Superior Court convened for two weeks' term this morning. Judge O. X. Allen presiding, and the trial of Raymond D. Bynum, for killing his business partner, James J. Alford, of the firm of Alford, Christopher and Bynum, printers, was set for Friday of this week. The defense will be insanity. Bynum had been drinking heavily, and was being roundly scolded for his conduct of the business by Alford when the shooting occurred last fall. Alford was the senior partner in the firm of Alford, Christopher and Bynum, and was a very highly esteemed man. Bynum has a wife and two children. Seems hopeless, and says he will surely be hanged. The defense will be insanity.

The grand jury may take action in the case of Policeman J. W. Rogers, for the shooting of John C. Dockery, although there has not yet been any preliminary hearing before a justice of the peace, on account of the condition of Dockery. This matter is not at all settled yet, however.

Men were started into all parts of the city this morning soliciting signatures for petitions calling for an election on the question of "dispensary" or "high license" for saloons, to be held in October. It will be necessary to have about 750 names, one-third of the registered voters. The "liquor men" of the city claim to have nothing whatever to do with the movement for the election, which is, it seems, being pushed by certain business interests.

The Young Men's Industrial Club and the Chamber of Commerce of Raleigh are moving together in the arrangement for a banquet to President Roosevelt on the evening of October 18th, the occasion being the visit of the President to Raleigh for the State Fair.

The building of Abner E. Board of Health, just issued, says smallpox continues to prevail throughout the State more widely than ever before, the number of counties being seventy-eight. There were 3,787 cases during the past year, 5,742 being negroes. There were thirteen white deaths and eighteen colored.

The Raleigh Aldermen have passed the ordinance prohibiting public cabs on the street after 9 o'clock, unless engaged by some customer. The fine prescribed is \$10. The ordinance was passed without opposition, but is being severely criticized by people about the city to-day.

At the same time the Aldermen passed a special ordinance allowing preaching on the streets, at the request of Rev. J. C. Tabacco, of Tabacco Baptist Church, who proposed to use "vesper wagons" for that purpose.

Both ordinances are in line with the reform movement that started after the sensational shooting of John C. Dockery by Policeman Rogers.
