HELPLESS AT SEA, MEN ATE SHARKS FOR FOOD

Terrible Suffering Aboard Disabled Athos—For Many Days Battered By Storm and Towed Into Port.

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, August 22.—The steamer Athos, seventeen days late, with eight passengers and a cargo of rotting bananas, and with the bones of half-eaten sharks on board to indicate the perils of her voyage, arrived off Scotland lightship last night.

On July 30th the Donald Steamship Company's steamer Athos left Port Antonio, Jamaica, for New York, a six days' voyage, with provisions in plenty for this short period.
