

PUBLIC SCHOOLS BIG ENROLLMENT

Large Increase in the Registered Number of Both White and Colored Schools.



NEW ORLEANS, LA., September 19.—The official yellow fever report to P. M. Tuesday, is as follows: New cases, 24. Total to date, 2,439. Deaths, 4. Total, 345.

Country reports are: Kenner, 3 new cases, 1 death; Alexandria, 2 new cases; Harvey's Canal, 1 case; Amella, 4 new cases; Bayou L'Ouare, 3 new cases; Bayou Bouff, 1 new case; St. Rose, 1 new case; Grand Isle, 1 case.

There now are only 632 persons sick at Leveville, and one death occurred Monday.

Mississippi.

Natchez, 2 new cases, 1 new fool; Gulfport, 1 new case; Mississippi City, 2 new cases; Vicksburg, 6 new cases, no deaths. Total to date, 41.
