M'EVROY OVER THREE HUNDRED

And Pitcher Hulcher Lacks Only One of Being in the High Class.

Batting averages of the Twin City League players just compiled show that the Brownies are justly entitled to the championship of the city.

The team average of the Brownies is .243, and John M'Evroy has the individual honor of hitting the ball oftener than the rest of his team mates.

His speed is .328, and he is exceeded only by Jack Anthony, who is batting .353.

Hulcher, the remarkable little southpaw twirler, is third in the hitting averages, and he lacks only one point of being in the .300 class.

Lawrence is tearing off .229, and has a fielding percentage that is almost perfect.

He is the smallest pitcher in the league; yet has the strike-out record hanging to his belt.

Eleven men opened the season with a batting average of .300 or better.

But this is the way the teams have fared: Brownies, .243; Manchester, .225; Barton Heights, .202; and Richmond, .190.
