

CLARKE RETURNS AND GOES AGAIN

Gets in Buggy With Friend, Rides a Short Distance and Jumps Out Again.

WANTS TO BE CHAIRMAN

R. W. Shuttlec, of Norfolk, Candidate for Head of Board of Fisheries.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) NORFOLK, Va., October 3.—John H. Clarke, of Berkeley, Va., who left his hat and coat on the ferry boat last week and disappeared, creating the impression that he had jumped overboard and been drowned, reappeared to-day and went into hiding again. He asked for a ride in the buggy of J. B. Ward, who was coming down town and got out of the buggy and has not been seen since. He was nervous, but sober and rational. His wife is distressed, and his friends are puzzled at his strange conduct, but they are relieved of suspense to know that he is alive.

FOR CHAIRMAN.

R. W. Shuttlec will stand for appointment to the chairmanship of the Virginia State Board of Fisheries under the Swanson administration. Two other Norfolk men were aspiring to the place, but they have agreed among themselves that only Mr. Shuttlec will stand for the position. He has the endorsement of prominent Swanson men in the Norfolk section. Mr. Shuttlec and his friends think that the position should come to Norfolk by reason of the fact that this city is the center, geographically and financially, of the oyster business of the State, and for the further reason that Norfolk has never had either the chairmanship or secretaryship of the board. They think that the fight for the place will be between Mr. Shuttlec and Mr. McDonald Lee, of Irvington. There are those in the State who think that William Matthews, of Accomac, stands a first-class show for the position. It is said that Dr. Fletcher, formerly chairman of the board, will not seek the place again as against William Matthews. A new candidate for the position is Dr. Moore, of Cape Charles. The place pays \$1,200 a year.

GREAT INCHONON'S ITINERARY.

John W. Cherry, Great Inchonon of the Improved Order of Red Men of the United States, left here this evening by way of Baltimore for Chicago, where he will make the first stop on what will be the longest official itinerary ever arranged for an executive head of that order. He will return to Norfolk about December 20th. Mr. Cherry will visit the great council of Iowa, in session at Des Moines, going from there to St. Paul, after which he will visit great councils and subordinate councils in North Dakota, South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. He expects to increase the membership in the United States from 25,000 to 45,000.

CHILDREN TO WELCOME PRESIDENT AT ASHLAND

Hundreds Will Assemble to Share in Paying Him Honor—Bushels of Flowers.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) ASHLAND, Va., October 3.—The committee for the reception of President Roosevelt at Ashland October 18th is making very unique and appropriate arrangements for that occasion. Dr. Blackwell, of Randolph-Macon College, in correspondence with the White House and with the President's secretary, Mr. Loeb, and has made special request that all the school children of Ashland may take part in the ceremony. It is planned to receive the president at the Henry Clay Inn with several hundred children, who will give the Chautauque salute with United States flags. Bushels of native dahlias and garlands of fall flowers will be heaped upon the President as he arrives and departs. The President's expressed interest in the school children of Ashland is recalled by Dr. Thomas Nelson Page. A special train of the Southern Railroad, bearing the presidential party, is expected to arrive at Ashland from Washington and Southern train No. 99, will arrive at Ashland at 11:27 A. M. on October 18th. Mr. Roosevelt has consented to address the students of Randolph-Macon College from the platform of his private car immediately after his arrival here.

COURT BUSY HEARING APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSE

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) MANASSAS, Va., October 3.—Judge C. B. Nicol, whose court is in session, spent the entire day to-day in hearing applications for liquor license. There was a contest in every case except one, the Prince William Hotel. Mr. P. T. Morgan was recommended by the Council, but did not make application to the court for license. Mr. J. R. Morris, proprietor of the Curry Hotel, withdrew his application, leaving only four applications to be heard. The Prince William Hotel and the Manassas Hotel were granted an ordinary license, and Mr. Lynch a retail license. The application of Vado Godwin was refused, the court ruling that his place of business, which was just across the street from the postoffice, was not a suitable place.

The delegates are: Barby, H. C. King, W. A. Willerby, H. W. Neator, A. S. Neale, S. S. Robinson, T. B. Sneed, W. T. Mookler, W. W. Gray, T. H. Edwards, Roy E. Cabell and William E. Croston. Mr. S. S. Robinson was elected commander-in-chief, Willerby, adjutant. They at once made application to Commander-in-Chief Owens for a charter for their camp.

SENT TO INVITE AT THE PRESIDENT

Committee of Prominent Citizens to Urge Him to Visit Petersburg.

MAY MEET THE OLD SOLDIERS

Will Be Asked to Come During the Confederate Reunion. Knights Templar.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) PETERSBURG, Va., October 3.—To invite President Roosevelt to visit Petersburg, if possible, during the Confederate reunion, October 25th to 27th, or at any time suitable to him, a delegation of leading citizens left for Washington at 7 o'clock this evening.

The committee is composed of the following representatives: From Board of Aldermen—Simon Seward and Carter R. Bishop; Common Council—George Cameron, Jr., James M. Quicke, William Budd; Chamber of Commerce—General Blith Bolling and Captain Nelson T. Patterson; Grand Camp of Confederate Veterans—Dr. William E. Harwood, commander; A. P. Hill Camp, C. V.—Richard B. Davis.

It has long been the purpose of these gentlemen to extend an invitation to the President to visit the city, and it is earnestly hoped that they may be able to arrange the schedule of his Southern trip so as to be present at the Confederate reunion and view the reproduction of the battle of the Crater on the historic field so near this city.

TO DELEGATE THIS CITY.

Ample appropriation of funds for the city and entertaining visiting veterans during the reunion were made by the Council at the regular meeting this evening. The resignations of the board of police commissioners, because of the Council's reversal of their decision in the case of two suspended policemen, did not come before that body, and will be considered at a joint meeting of Aldermen and Councilmen. A resolution from the Board of Aldermen, requiring telegraph companies to put their wires underground, was not considered.

James M. Quicke, an honored councilman of long service, tendered his resignation, which was tabled.

Emment Sir W. B. McChesney, of Staunton, came over this evening from Richmond to inspect Appomattox Commandery Knights Templar, representative of the R. E. Grand Commandery of the State. The distinguished Templar, accompanied by Sir Knights J. M. Boykin and E. D. Hotchkiss, of Richmond, was met at the depot by representatives of the local commandery, including Past Grand Commander John E. Townes, at whose home he is staying.

After the inspection at Masonic Hall, a handsome banquet was given by Appomattox Commandery in honor of the visiting Knights.

"Hurricane" Branch, of Suffolk, with his two bloodhounds, stopped over in Petersburg for a while to-day on his way home from Amherst county, where he has been trailing the assailant of Mrs. Frank Brown.

TO GO WITH THEM.

Senator Martin Will Accompany Committee to White House.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C., October 3.—Senator Martin and Representative Swanson are on the Rappahannock River, en route to the White House. The senator arrived early this afternoon after driving around over the country for some time in company with Mr. Swanson and Mr. Connor Goolrick, trying to find Stafford Courthouse, where the gubernatorial nominee and Senator Martin were billed to speak. The party got lost and the senator returned to Fredericksburg and came to this city, but Mr. Swanson persevered and finally reached the Courthouse and made a speech. Senator Martin is here to accompany a delegation from Petersburg to the White House to-morrow morning to invite President Roosevelt to visit that city.

MUSSELMAN RESIGNS.

Conflict of Military and Business Duties Makes Trouble.

Musselman, commanding the Danville Light Infantry, Company M, 10th Cavalry Regiment, Virginia Volunteers, has resigned his position as Adjutant-General Nalle. The action of Captain Musselman is due to the conflict of his military and business duties. An election will be held shortly to fill the vacancy made by Captain Musselman's resignation and Mr. J. P. Watkins, who recently left Danville to make his future home in Richmond.

TWO MEN HURT IN PISTOL DUEL

Man Defies Arrest After Beating His Wife and Now He Will Probably Die.

THREATEN DEATH FOR WOMAN

There Was Talk of a Lynching Until It Was Known How Seriously Man Was Hurt.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) ABINGDON, Va., October 3.—Officer James Bradley, who brought a number of prisoners here for trial before the United States court, which began its sessions here yesterday, and Ed. Gallier, an employe of Henry's livery stable here, engaged in a pistol battle last night, a number of shots being exchanged, and the result being that both men were shot, Bradley being wounded in the hand and Gallier in the thigh.

Gallier had been drinking heavily for the past few days, and on yesterday evening, it is said, gave his wife a severe beating, and remarked that later on he was going to kill his wife and himself.

Complaint was made to the city authorities, and Bradley was deputized to arrest Gallier. He went to the home of Gallier, and found him in the yard with a pistol in his hand, defying arrest. As he approached Gallier opened fire, which the officer promptly returned.

Several shots were exchanged, when Gallier ran into the house and barricaded the door.

Officer Bradley came back to town and had his hand treated, and went back to arrest Gallier. As he stepped on the porch he was fired upon from within.

Again he returned the fire, and attempted to force open the door, at last being successful, only to find that his man had escaped through a rear passage. He secured a posse and pair of bloodhounds, and after an exciting chase captured Gallier a mile below town. He was found to be bleeding profusely from the thigh wound, and physicians say he cannot live.

Gallier has a rather unsavory reputation, and this is not the first time he has been in the toils.

There is a large crowd in attendance upon United States court, and among the number are a large number of Bradley's friends, who talked strongly of lynching until it was found how seriously the prisoner had been wounded.

WINCHESTER GIRL ILLEGALLY HELD

Parents Have Become Reconciled After Separation, and Now Desire to Recover Daughter.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) WINCHESTER, Va., October 3.—After lengthy proceedings in the Circuit Court of Frederick county, Judge Harrison dismissed one of the most sensational cases in many months, which involved the custody of Miss Wilson, the eleven-year-old daughter of William R. and Fannie Wilson, who was alleged to have been illegally held and detained by the family of Gus Orndorff, in whose charge she had been left prior to Wilson and his wife becoming united after a separation.

In their petition for a writ of habeas corpus, the Wilsons referred to the arrests as the "Orndorff tribe, intolerant and iron-handed captors," and alleged that Mrs. Orndorff threatened to scold out the eyes of the child. After the matter in controversy was settled, the child was restored to her parents.

FORSYTHE COUNTY FAIR. Memorial to Confederate Dead Unveiled at Winston-Salem.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., October 3.—The Forsythe County Fair opened to-day, and although the weather was very unfavorable, a large crowd visited the grounds this afternoon. Taken as a whole, the fair is a most creditable affair; the county exhibit being especially good.

WRECK AT DANVILLE. Trainman Chandler, of the Southern, Slightly Injured.
