"The Geisha," as produced by the Laura Millard Opera Company this season, is thoroughly in keeping with its former successful runs in London and New York, as all the costumes, scenic effects and accessories used in the orig-

inal Augustina Daly production at Daly's Theatre, New York, are carried by the company. Miss Laura Millard in the role of "O Mimosa San," has been pronounced by the leading critics as the ideal in this gaily role. The visit of "The Geisha" at the Academy to-morrow and Tuesday nights should prove most interesting to theatregoers.

In "The Geisha" there is a simple story, a pretty story with simple, pretty music. The name, pronounced as everybody by this time probably knows, "The Geisha," is that given to a young woman who, in Japanese tea houses entertains customers by singing and dancing.

The little story is told with much cleverness and chic. The picturesque scenery of the two acts serves as an excellent background for the gorgeous Japanese costumes, naval uniforms and European dresses. The dialogue is more than bright and interspersed with witty lines, and the interest is more than served all during the action of the piece.

The lyrics are gracefully written, whose the music is light, but in no wise of the cheap order. It is all musically. There are no labored attempts at characteristic effects, but on the other hand, the auditor is treated to strains in keeping with the theme.

Crane and Hilda Spang. William H. Crane will be presented at the Academy Wednesday and Thursday nights by Charles Frohman, in the new comedy entitled, "The American Lord." In it the comedian will return to a type of character in which he has become thoroughly identified, and one in which he has gained distinction. There is no denying that Mr. Crane is an actor of many talents. In his time he has played many parts of a wide and diversified nature. But the one type in which the public has liked him best is that of the rugged, middle-aged American. He has shown various shades of this man's composition; shown him as the Governor of his State, as a senator, a congressman, a lawyer, a broker, and as the dotting father of a family. "The middle-class American, honest, independent, aggressive and big-hearted, he has reproduced with such naturalness and art that now all characters of this class are known on the stage as "Crane types."

"The comedy is the work of Charles T. Dazey and George H. Broadhurst. The lines on which it is built is of a highly humorous turn. The proposition handled by the dramatists is this: In a small Western town there is a citizen of middle age, average education and less polish. He is a whole-souled and lovable type of man, who stands high with his fellows. He is honest, affectionate and show. The insincerity and snobbishness of foreigners he abhors. A little sounds to him like a joke. He is talked of for Congress, and just at the crucial moment when the nomination is likely to be handed him, he is notified that he is the lineal descendant of an English lord, and heir to a large estate. In spite of himself, he is forced to become a lord. The question now is, What would a man of the temperament and energy of this Westerner be likely to do when placed in England as the lord and master of a large estate? He is in the working out of this question

that much of the humor of the play is developed.

There are three love stories running through the comedy, and the sentiment is dainty and sweet, without being mawkish. The love interest is heightened as well as complicated by an old family feud.

Mr. Crane is capably suited in the comedy. His leading woman is Miss Hilda Spang, and Mr. Frohman has surrounded him with an exceptionally well balanced company. The play is divided into four acts.

The Player Maid. Miss Florence Davis, who was seen here last season in "The Player Maid," will again present that piece at the Academy Friday and Saturday.

Miss Davis is a young woman of exceedingly attractive personality, who has attained her present position of importance in the theatrical profession through earnest endeavor and hard work, combined with fine artistic temperament and natural histrionic gifts of a most distinctive character. Miss Davis began at the lowest rung of the theatre ladder and studied diligently while she played her first small parts in various companies, under the direction of Charles Frohman and other important managers. It is due to this earnest preparation that she has gained the distinction now attained.

As Eleanor Hallam, "The Player Maid," Miss Davis has been furnished with a most charming character, admirably suited to her buoyant temperament, exceptional ability and rare graces of personality. As the title indicates, the story of the play has to do with the theatre, always a fascinating subject to the general public.
