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LEADS KELLY STATE SHIPPING PORTS. Bulletin Places Newport News Ahead of Norfolk and Portsmouth Combined. Little Behind in Cotton City, However, Exports Ten Times As Much Wheat and Corn.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C., October 30.—While Newport News has not a general reputation as a great cotton port, it is a fact that it shipped almost as much cotton in 1904 as was shipped from the ports of Norfolk and Portsmouth. Norfolk and Portsmouth shipped last year 3,901,615 pounds of cotton. Newport News shipped in the same period 3,502,115 pounds.

Newport News has shipped thus far this year 11,076,010 pounds of cotton, and for the same period there have been shipped through the ports of Norfolk and Portsmouth 10,683,204 pounds. Newport News seems to be gaining on the other Virginia ports.

Wheat exported from Newport News last year amounted to 153,909 bushels. None went out of Norfolk and Portsmouth. Thus far this year Newport News has shipped 46,794 barrels of flour. The total quantity shipped through this port last year was 95,412 barrels.

The Corn exported through the port of Newport News this year is 2,817,718 bushels; through Norfolk and Portsmouth, 778,538 bushels. The bulletin gives considerable data regarding the features of the port of Newport News. It is stated that the channel, leading up to the city is twenty-six feet deep in its shallowest place at mean low tide.

The value of the domestic exports from the port of Newport News declined within the five years ended in 1904. The value of exports made by the steamship exports from Newport News was \$35,000,000; in 1902, \$34,000,000, and in 1901 the shipments amounted to only one-half as much, or \$17,000,000.

About one vessel a month carries cattle from Newport News to Glasgow and Liverpool, and about the same number of voyages are made by cattle steamers from Newport News to London, when some of the cattle are forwarded to Rotterdam. The freight rate on cattle from Newport News to European ports varies from \$1.50 to \$10 a head.

The oil cake shipped through Newport News comes chiefly from St. Louis and Chicago, with occasional shipments from Kansas City and Louisville. The grain comes chiefly from Illinois, Indiana and Ohio; the flour from Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana and Missouri; the cottonseed oil from Kentucky. Some vessels come to Newport News light, and load partly at that port, and complete their cargoes at Portsmouth and Norfolk.

The Chesapeake and Ohio terminals at Newport News cover about fifty acres, and have a capacity for handling 2,000 cars a day. The railroad has three coal piers, five covered merchandise piers, two grain elevators and a 30-ton electric crane for loading and unloading goods.

Value of Norfolk Harbor. The bulletin calls attention to the fact that the Norfolk-Portsmouth harbor is the only one of any importance on the Atlantic coast which is entered from the north. The minimum depth of the channel is 26 feet. The description of the harbor is accurate. "Sailing up the Elizabeth river," says the bulletin, "one passes on the left Lambert's Point, a seaward terminal of the Norfolk and Western Railroad, and on the right is Finer's Point, where are the terminals of the Southern Railway and the Atlantic Coast Line. Farther up the river, in the city of Norfolk, the Norfolk and Western Railway has other terminal facilities.

The terminals of the Southern Railway at Pinners Point cover fifty acres and 1,000 cars a day can be handled there. The buildings consist of three wharves, one cotton compress, one coal pier, and a largest pier is 800 feet long and 200 feet wide.

BROTHERS OF BRIDE BEAT HIM; KIDNAP HER

Former British Army Officer Says Delano Boys Attacked Him After Wedding.

Port of Wilmington.

The Cape Fear River, protected at the mouth by a bar, offers a shelter to the coasting vessels, and others, who desire to escape wintry storms. The anchorage just across the bar, near the town of Southport, is a good one. Twenty-seven miles farther up the Cape Fear River the port of Wilmington offers not only a safe anchorage, but facilities for loading and unloading trans-Atlantic vessels.

Export of Cotton.

The principal export from Wilmington is cotton, raised in the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama, and occasionally some from Virginia. The value of the exports from Wilmington in 1904 was \$19,085,221, of which cotton made \$18,780,283. Most of this cotton was sent to Germany and was carried in German vessels. A considerable quantity, however, was consigned to the United Kingdom. The leading foreign ports to which the cotton from Wilmington is shipped are Bremen, Liverpool and Ghent.
