

ALDERMAN WILL NOT ALLOW THORPE TO PLAY

Virginia University Must Not Be Put On Lower Plane Than Columbia.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) LYNCHBURG, Va., November 1.—Ex-Captain Thorpe, of the football eleven of Columbia University, who was dropped recently from that institution for academic deficiency has appeared at the University of Virginia, and a strong effort is being made by the athletic association to persuade him to play Thorpe was a source of a deep regret to him as it would be to any student in the institution, but that he did not think Mr. Thorpe should be allowed to represent Virginia on the gridiron, though the "Dr. Alderman" regarded him as the most wonderful tackle he had ever seen play.

The local alumni association was asked by the Athletic Association of the University to add them in the effort to have Thorpe play, but after a conversation with President Alderman over the long distance phone it was decided that no action would be taken here. The alumni of the university here are delighted over the stand of Dr. Alderman and many claim it is one of the best things that have been done for the institution for a long time.

MUCH CAST DAWN

Sorrow at Decision, But They Yell for Alderman and Faculty.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., November 1.—The recent joy in football ranks at the University of Virginia over the acquisition of Thorpe, the former Columbia captain, to the squad for the season, President Alderman stated today that he had not passed upon the matter and he considered it one of academic dignity and therefore a question for the faculty to dispose of, but that he would earnestly advocate that Thorpe be not permitted to play on the team as the University of Virginia should not be put on a lower plane than Columbia.

To say that the Virginia student body is disappointed at the step taken by the faculty is expressing it mildly. A mass meeting of students was held on the lawn this afternoon, while the faculty meeting was in session. After listening to addresses by Chandler, the star catcher on the base-ball team and other athlete enthusiasts, the crowd adjourned to the academy building, where the president and faculty was in session, and gave the college yell for President Alderman, "the faculty" and "Thorpe."

Dr. Pollard, one of the representatives of the Athletic Association, appeared and told the students that the association's side of the matter had been duly presented to the faculty and that a decision would soon be reached. The crowd thereon marched in a body to Lambeth's field, where the football game was in progress and where Thorpe was in uniform engaging in practice.

FIRE IN DANVILLE

Tremendously Large Breaks of Tobacco Continue.
