(Continued from First Page.) bers to solicit practice, or to engage therein for a tariff of fees less than that adopted by the association.

"Be it resolved, That under the rules of this association, its members are prohibited from being interested in or from acting as representatives of corporations which commit acts, that if committed by individual members of the association, would be transgressors of the foregoing provisions."

"Your committee," says the report, "most earnestly urges the adoption of the foregoing resolution and desired to express the belief that failure to do so may result in the springing up in this city of a condition of affairs that will impair the usefulness of the association and even imperil its existence."

Mr. Campbell's Explanation.

Discussion began immediately after a motion by Mr. D. C. O'Flaherty that the report be adopted. Mr. Irving E. Campbell, general counsel of the Virginia Corporation Company, the operations of which were the immediate cause for the raising of the question by Mr. Moore, read a lengthy statement, outlining his position, defending the company, and indicating that if the resolutions recommended by the committee were adopted he would withdraw from the association.

DAN STUART, NOTED SPORTING MAN, DYING.

Texan Best Known as the Promoter of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons Fight.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) NEW YORK, January 16.—Dan Stuart, the well known sporting man, is dying of pneumonia at his home here. A consultation was called this afternoon and a bulletin issued that the chances for his recovery were very remote. Drs. Lambert Moore and Outbridge are attending him.

Stuart is best known as the promoter of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight at Carson City, Nevada. When these two were matched Stuart put in a bid for the contest. It was the best offered and was accepted. His intention was to pull off the fight at Dallas, Texas. The Governor opposed it and called a special session of the legislature and passed a bill prohibiting prize-fighting in that State. He then turned his attention to Hot Springs, Ark. Again his plans were frustrated. The Governor of that State interfering, Stuart still determined to hold the fight, went to Nevada, where he prevailed upon several politicians to frame a bill permitting the fight. This was done, and the now famous fight between Ruby Robert and Corbett was held, which cost Stuart a large sum of money.

Stuart is a half owner in the Oakland Race Track at Hot Springs.
