

CHARITY WORK IN THIS CITY

Associated Charity Makes a Report of the Scope of Its Work.

MR. BUCHANAN AT THE HEAD

Interesting Stories of Cases That Have Been Relieved By the Association.

The work of the Associated Charities of Richmond, incorporating under one management the Citizens' Relief Association of Richmond, City Mission of Richmond, and the Baptist Neighborhood House, is now in active operation at the Old Ballard House, 108 East Franklin Street.

During the month of January the general secretary of the Associated Charities, Rev. James Buchanan, has been collecting all the available information regarding the applicants for charity in the city of Richmond during the past year.

Lady Visitors.

The ladies of the City Mission visit this class and administer sympathetically to their necessary needs. 34 tons of coal and provisions to the amount of \$470.29 have been supplied during the past month.

Out of 1,499 applicants 140 were emergency cases due to sickness, loss of employment and accident; 280 were cases for permanent relief due to old age and partial disability; 140 were worthy cases, due to dependent widows and deserted wives with young children; 840 applicants were able-bodied persons, in which the causes are drink, opiate, disinclination for work, lack of training for work and idleness.

At the Ballard House the Associated Charities are conducting an industrial mission for homeless men and women, in which the principle of constructive charity has been fully tested.

Industrial Mission. As can be readily seen, only forty per cent. (560) of the 1,499 cases come under the class which should be helped without asking work in return for the aid given.

Many pitiful stories of degradation might be told, wholly due to this practice. Well-meaning citizens who desire to do good are unconsciously encouraging laziness, debauchery and crime.

Money Needed. We need money to equip this plant. The work offered not only becomes a test of the worthiness of the applicant but enables them to become self-reliant by giving their labor in exchange for help received.

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ARE UNWILLING TO EXEMPT JUDGES

Violent Opposition in Senate in Regard to Amending Income Tax Law.

FLOOD OF HOUSE BILLS

Solons of Lower House Seeking By Many Measures to Better Their State.

Interest in legislative affairs yesterday centered very largely in the Senate when two interesting discussions sprang up in connection with bills on the calendar.

THE SENATE. Lively Discussion Over Income Tax Situation.

Two interesting discussions engaged the attention of the Senate yesterday to the exclusion of other business.

Considerable discussion sprang up over the Thomas bill, providing for the issuance of county bonds for permanent road improvement.

It Cuts Deeply. Not only does this constitutional question affect the bill under discussion, but it touches upon a condition that cuts deeply in every direction.

Salaries of Judges. Similar course was taken by the Wickham bill, exempting the salaries of judges from the income tax.

Bills Introduced. By Mr. Bland: To authorize the city of Portsmouth to issue bonds to establish waterworks to furnish a supply of water, etc.

By Mr. Spessard: To amend the revenue act as to tax on physicians', surgeons' and dentists' licenses.

By Mr. Lewis: To provide for working, building and repairing of roads and bridges in the county of Essex.

By Mr. Throckmorton: To amend section 271 of the Code as to commissioners of accounts, their duties, etc.

By Mr. Puller (by request): To provide for the collection and enforcement of certain claims, debts and judgments due the State and to prevent the running of the statute of limitation as to such claims.

By Mr. Slaughter: To repeal an act authorizing the supervisors of Culpeper to divide equally for road purposes among all the magisterial districts, the district road tax, etc.

By Mr. Mason: To amend the act "concerning corporations," approved May 21, 1903, as to local attorneys on whom process may be served, etc.

By Mr. Wilkins (by request): To submit to the freehold voters of Eastville, Northampton county, the question whether or not an act incorporating the town shall be repealed.

By Mr. Peyton: To amend the act concerning corporations, as to the dissolution of corporations, the closing up of their affairs, litigation, etc.

By J. L. C. Lindsay: To incorporate the town of Galax, in the counties of Grayson and Carroll.

By C. W. Throckmorton: To amend and re-enact section 339 of the Code relating to commissioners in chancery.

By E. V. Gaines: To amend and re-enact section 10, schedule D, of an act to raise revenue for support of the government and public free schools, and to provide a special tax for pensions.
