DURHAM'S DRINKING WATER PROTECTED. Temporary Injunction Against Polluting Same With Dye Stuffs. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) DURHAM, N. C., February 15.—Judge G. S. Ferguson has rendered a decision in the case of the city of Durham against the Eno Cotton Mills, of Hillsboro, restrained from dumping garbage into Eno River after April 20th, until the trial hearing, from which Durham receives her water supply. The argument of the case was completed last Saturday, but the decision was withheld until to-day.

SAVED HIS WAY OUT WAKE COUNTY JAIL

Prisoner Sentenced to Twenty Years for Murder Makes His Escape.

TROUBLE IN COUNTY SCHOOL

Teacher Would Not Allow Children or Himself to Be Vaccinated.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.)

RALEIGH, N. C., February 15.—Burton Jarrell, a negro, under sentence to twenty-five years in the penitentiary for murdering W. G. King, in Warren county, saved his way out of Wake county jail, where he was for safekeeping, this morning. Jarrell and his accomplice, Garfield Hicks, were in the cell, the latter having had a mistrial in December and secured a postponement of his second trial this week at Warrenton. Hicks declined to go out with Jarrell, who sawed a hole about a foot square through the heavy bars of the prison cell and then sawed two of the window bars, and then lowered himself to the ground. The escape was discovered about 6 o'clock. None of the other prisoners would give out alarm while Jarrell was making out. His case was argued on appeal in Supreme Court Tuesday of this week. Every effort is being made by the sheriff and his deputies to capture the fugitive.

HIGH POINT DEVELOPMENTS.

Governor Glenn returned this afternoon from High Point, where he attended the Manufacturers' Club reception and banquet last night. He was delighted with the affair, and is enthusiastic over the wonderful development of the town as a great furniture manufacturing center. There is quite a diversity of industries there, too, he says, and a remarkable spirit of enterprise and co-operation among the business interests of the city. The Governor will be in the executive office the remainder of the week.

WORK IS TO BEGIN IN THE EARLY SPRING AND BE PUSHED AS RAPIDLY AS POSSIBLE TO COMPLETION. THE GRAND LODGE EXPECTS TO HOLD THEIR NEXT ANNUAL SESSION IN JANUARY, 1937, IN THE NEW TEMPLE, ALTHOUGH IT MAY NOT BE COMPLETED BY THAT TIME.

REFUSED VACCINATION.

A report comes from Union county of the arrest of C. G. Morgan, principal of the Walker school, near Waxhaw, for refusing to allow County Physician H. D. Stewart to vaccinate the children and the principal, such an order having been made by the county board on account of an epidemic of smallpox in the neighborhood. The teacher refused to allow himself to be vaccinated, because, he said, he had had smallpox before and was immune. The parents of the children had directed the teacher not to allow their children to be vaccinated. Which the county physician had an assistant appear, the children began jumping out of the windows and getting out the best way they could, until they were assured by the teacher that he would not allow them to be vaccinated. H. G. Griffin, a visitor to the school, was also arrested for refusing to allow himself to be vaccinated. The defense claims that the teacher would have been personally liable to the parents if he had allowed the children to be vaccinated. The law makes it, on the other hand, a misdemeanor to violate orders made by the county boards. The trial justice has the case under advisement, and it will probably come up to the Supreme Court, either way it may be decided.

JUMPED HIS BOND.

While Discussing Raising the Amount Hall Disappeared. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) SALISBURY, N. C., Feb. 15.—Mr. Grover Cleveland Hall, whose arrest several weeks ago on complaint of Mr. L. Thomas, of Spencer, who charged him with larceny, created a sensation, has left Salisbury and nothing is known of his whereabouts. Mr. Hall was in Mr. Thomas' employ as chief clerk, and was one of the most popular young men in Spencer. On the charge of storebreaking and robbing Mr. Thomas' safe he was discharged. Later he was indicted for larceny and bound over to the Superior Court. He put up a cash bond of \$100, and when court convened Monday morning he was on hand.

Yesterday it was proposed to increase the bond to \$300, and it was about this time that Mr. Hall disappeared.

FIREMAN KILLED.

Lynchburg Contractor Double-Tracking the Southern. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) SPENCER, N. C., February 15.—William Spencer, colored, a fireman on the Southern Railway, died at his home in Monroe, Va., died at his home in Spencer yesterday from the effects of injuries sustained in an accident at Greensboro Monday morning. He was on duty obtaining water facilities at the station.

The lack of night service is the principal grievance against the railroad. The commissioners promised to take the matter up for consideration on their return to Richmond.
