William Collins, the English poet, was born on December 25, 1718, at Chichester, where he died June 12, 1753. He was educated at Westminster and at Oxford, where he graduated in 1742, with the honor of entering the ministry, but he never went to London for literary pursuits. His poems bear the stamp of true genius, but "fell flat" on his contemporaries. He was a man of great energy and a man of great courage.
