

ANNIVERSARY DAY OF EMANCIPATION

Colored People Came From All Over the State to Celebrate It. MANY BANDS OF MUSIC Lengthy Parade on the Streets, and Exercises in Broad-Street Park.

The colored people from all over the country met and celebrated in Richmond yesterday up to late in the night. The important event of Emancipation Day, it is estimated that there were 35,000 dusky visitors in the city, the trains bringing them in up to late yesterday morning.

The grand parade took place at 12 o'clock yesterday and was at least eight blocks long. It consisted of five bands from Richmond and other cities; clubs and other organizations; carriages containing distinguished personages of color, and an immense crowd of all those who wished to swell the throng by walking and carrying canes and flags.

Exercises, under the auspices of the Afro-American Emancipation Association, were held at Broad Street Park after the parade, and a program was attended. The throng was a beautiful harmony of color, with the reds, greens and purples of the dresses worn by the females added to the brilliantly colored neckwear and hat-bands of the men and boys.
