POPULAR YOUNG MAN VICTIM OF GAMBLING

Thomas Young Under Arrest for Newport News for Forgery.

"NEWPORT NEWS, VA., May 19.—Thomas Young, formerly senior member of the local real estate firm of Young & Mason, was arrested in Norfolk this morning on a warrant, charging him with forging the name of John P. Fraley to a note for \$10. The arrest was made by Acting Detective Sergeant W. W. Morrison. Young is now in the station house here awaiting a preliminary hearing.

Several months ago Young disappeared from the city, leaving behind scores of clamoring creditors, and hundreds of dollars' worth of notes in the bank. Later he wrote from Chicago to his former partner, Gerard Mason, saying that he would return to Newport News on April 20th and settle up his affairs. He returned about April 20th, but left again after a few days.

Soon after the young man left the second time the warrant, charging forgery, was sworn out. He was located near Danville, but got away from there before he could be arrested. Yesterday it was learned that he had been seen in Norfolk and this morning Sergeant Morrison was sent over to look for him.

Young is one of the best known young men in the city, and was highly regarded in business circles until his disappearance. Gambling is supposed to have caused his downfall.
