

TOOK NEGRO FROM FATHER OF GIRL

Mob Then Stood Him on Dry-Goods Box and Shot Him to Pieces.

ENGLISH GIRL ASSAULTED

Young Lady in Dying Condition, and Child Was Brutally Beaten.

(By Associated Press.) COLUMBIA, S. C., August 20.—Bob Etheridge, the negro who on Thursday last attempted to criminally assault the seven-year-old daughter of J. H. West, a well-to-do farmer of the Mount Willing section of Saluda county, was shot to death by a mob, nine miles from Sumnerland, Saluda county, about 9 o'clock to-night.

It was the intention of the father of the child upon whom Etheridge made a brutal attempt to assault, to take him to the scene of his crime and there shoot him to death, and he left Sumnerland this morning with the negro, but he was overtaken by the mob. Etheridge was placed upon a dry-goods box and asked to talk further than to say that he was guilty. The mob then proceeded to riddle his body with bullets. The mob numbered two hundred men.

To-night a long distance message from the attending physician stated that there was some hope of the West girl's surviving.

GIRL ASSAULTED; LYNCHING LIKELY

(By Associated Press.) ATLANTA, GA., August 20.—As the result of an attack on Miss Ethel Lawrence of London, England, and her 14-year-old niece, by a negro, early to-day, near the home of the little girl in a suburb of this city, Miss Lawrence and her niece were lynchings, and the child is suffering from blows from a stick inflicted by the negro. The country is being secured by posse to-night and if the negro is captured he will probably be lynched. Miss Lawrence and her niece were lynched a short distance from the house when the negro attacked them.

APPEAL OF MAYOR SAVED THIS NEGRO

(By Associated Press.) TAMPA, FLA., August 20.—Will Lawrence, a negro, 22 years old, was brought here to-night by Marshal Logan, of Lakeland, and placed in Hillsborough county jail for safekeeping. It being feared that he would be lynched by a mob at Lakeland.

Lawrence is accused of attempting to assault the daughter of Section Foreman David of the Atlantic Coast Line, near her home. When the negro advanced upon the girl she screamed and ran. A posse caught Lawrence shortly afterwards and the girl identified him. A crowd of 500 men gathered and took the negro from the officers, but Mayor Cox, of Lakeland, appealed to the mob to let the law take its course. The negro was then delivered to the officers and placed in Lakeland jail. Later he was put aboard the Coast Line train for Tampa.

RAVING LUNATIC AS RESULT OF LYNCHINGS

(By Associated Press.) CHARLESTON, S. C., August 20.—A special from Greenwood to-night tells of the arrest and placing in jail of Bob Faust, colored, 30 years old, who this afternoon went crazy, attacking over the recent lynchings, and announced that he would assault every woman he met. Three times he attacked colored women, and was driven away without doing them any harm. He entered the premises of Benjamin King, a white farmer, professing that he meant to assault the women of the place. He had a gun, but King succeeded in disarming him, and took him to Greenwood, apparently a raving lunatic.

Schenck Elected.


CRUSOE'S ISLAND IS DESTROYED BY QUAKE

DOCTOR PRESTON DIES ON A TRIP

Superintendent of the Southwestern State Hospital on the Way to Canada.

NO PARTICULARS OF DEMISE

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) MAHON, VA., August 20.—Dr. Robert J. Preston, superintendent of the Southwestern State Hospital at Marion, died this afternoon in Lewiston, N. Y., while on his way to Toronto, Canada, to attend a meeting of the British Medical Society, of which he was an invited guest. No particulars as to his death have been received here. Dr. Preston was born in Washington county, Va., in 1841. He received his academic education at Emory and Henry

College, and graduated in medicine at the University of Virginia in 1867. He practiced his profession in Abingdon, Va., until 1887, when he was made first assistant physician at the Southwestern State Hospital. Upon the death of Dr. Harvey Black two years later, Dr. Preston was elected to the office of superintendent of the hospital, which position he held at the time of his death.

Dr. Preston had become widely known in his profession. From 1884 to 1890 he was a member of the Medical Examining Board of Virginia. In 1901 he was elected president of the American Psychological Society.

He was also at one time president of the Medical Society of Virginia. He was the author of many valuable papers on medical subjects, especially psychiatry, which was his specialty.

He is survived by his wife and three children, Dr. Eleanor Norman Preston, of San Francisco; Robert S. Preston, of John Hopkins University; and Stuart Preston, of Marion.

The funeral took place this afternoon in Keysville cemetery. The Episcopal service was read at the grave.
