

MARINES ARE DRIVEN OUT BY THE FEVER

Appearance of Yellow Jack Causes Them to Be Sent to Ships.

GOVERNOR MAGOON ARRIVES AT HAVANA

Has Long Conference With Governor Taft and Mr. Bacon and Declines to Discuss Future Policy—Troops Being Sent From Newport News.

GIENFUEGOS, October 9.—Colonel Barnett to-day ordered the immediate removal of the American marines from the city on account of the appearance here of yellow fever.

HAVANA, October 9.—(Special Telegram.) The newly appointed provisional Governor of Cuba, arrived here this afternoon.

Upon arriving at the palace, Mr. Taft and Mrs. Bacon entered their private apartments and then Governor Taft, Mr. Bacon and Mr. Magoon had a long conference in the Governor's office.

Following this conference, Mr. Magoon received the members of the press. He declined to discuss his plans for the future.

Would Not Allow Unveiling.

GIENFUEGOS, October 9.—According to authoritative sources at Governor Taft, Colonel General Magoon this afternoon discharged the chief of police of the city and appointed a Havana man, Captain Landy, to command the rural guards as the chief of police.

TAFT PROCLAIMS AMNESTY IN CUBA

Secretary of War Also Outlines Duties of American Forces on Island.

HAVANA, October 9.—William H. Taft, as provisional Governor of Cuba and Secretary of War of the United States, today issued an order in Havana, Cuba, proclaiming amnesty in Cuba.

The order makes it plain that the amnesty will remain on the island, for the present, as an adjunct to the military operations as well as to the killing of several rebel chiefs at Guanabacoa last February.



HEARST SURE TO WIN IN LAWSON'S OPINION

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CROWD TAKES KEEN INTEREST IN FAIR RACES

Opening Day Ideal and Management Is Well Pleased.

FEATURES WERE GREATLY ENJOYED

Largest Crowd of Day Saw Speed Trials and Good Records Were Made—Competitive Drill This Morning—Races This Afternoon. Midway.

The first annual exhibition of the Virginia State Fair Association was unusually successful yesterday, and will continue today, tomorrow, Thursday and Friday, showing an attendance of 100,000.

As the hour passed and the hour for the races arrived, the attendance was rapidly and steadily augmented, until, at the high mark, it was approximately 12,000 to 15,000, and some estimated the total attendance of over 100,000.

The day program was carried out in full, beginning with the inaugural addresses in the forenoon, followed by the races, which commenced at 4 P. M.

The free feature shows were all given in the oval formed by the race track and directly in front of the grandstand.

Address of Mr. Stuart.

The formal opening program began with a procession of citizens, comprising the State and city officials, county officers and full officials, leaving the City Hall about 10:30 A. M.

Mr. Stuart, president of the State Fair Association, made the opening address, briefly outlining the movement for a State Fair and its consummation.

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
