ONE CENT A WORD. LAWMAKERS HAVE THEIR BUSY DAY. Burke County and Morgantown Declared Prohibition by Carolina Legislature.

SING "GOOD BYE BOOZE"

At Least Representative Hawkins Calls for That Classic—Insurance Matters.

RALEIGH, N. C., January 17.—This, the eighth day, proved by odds the busiest thus far of the session of the General Assembly with respect to the number and importance of bills introduced, bills passed and the work of the committees. The House passed the bill by Avery, of Burke, making Burke county and town of Morgantown prohibition; also a bill for prohibition at Littleton. As these bills were voted by big majorities, Representative Hawkins, of Davidson called on the members of the House to join in singing "Good-by Booze." Also in the House Preston, of Mecklenburg, introduced by unanimous consent a bill to establish a reformatory and training school for wayward, delinquent and criminal children; and Peele, of Scotland, introduced a bill to punish negligence of employes of railroad companies. It provides that for carelessness and negligence in causing wrecks or employes guilty shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court, that where persons are killed or death results from injuries within the year, the guilty employe shall be imprisoned from three to thirty years, and persons guilty of causing death, the imprisonment shall be two months to five years.

Passengers' Rights.

In the Senate a bill to define rights of passengers entering and leaving trains was introduced at a recent session and finally referred to the Judiciary committee.

Insurance Legislation.

The recommendations of the Insurance Commissioner J. R. Young sent to Governor Glenn and the General Assembly this afternoon include the enactment of a law regulating the placing of fire escapes on large buildings, a law requiring fire insurance companies to provide what is known as a safety fund to guard against great fire losses; that some portion of the taxes received from fire insurance companies be set aside for the benefit of disabled firemen and their families, instead of adding additional tax on the company for this purpose.

Death of Patient.

In the trial of the four State hospital attendants—King, High, Durham and Peele—charged with causing the death of the patient Thomas Hall, by cruel treatment, in progress here the jury returned a verdict that they consented to dismiss the charge against Peele, for the reason that the evidence does not prove that he was the cause until after Hall had been captured and the alleged cruel treatment inflicted.

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James Ward to Be Executed This Morning for Murder of Carrie Meekins. Lowlands.

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Enormous Loss of Property Is Predicted Along the Lowlands.

Between 7 and 8 o'clock this morning, James Ward, a negro, will be hanged by the neck until he is dead. The execution will be in the City Hall, and will be witnessed by only the officials, the jurymen and a few selected spectators.

Thirty Feet at Fairmont.

The Monongahela River has reached a thirty-foot stage at Fairmont, W. Va., and is rising a foot an hour. The lowlands are inundated, and indications are that the river will exceed the flood stage reached in 1888. The Ohio River, at Huntington, W. Va., is fifty-two feet four inches high, and rising. Considerable damage is expected. Parkerburg, W. Va., is being flooded by the Ohio and Little Kanawha Rivers. From present conditions, a forty-foot stage is expected. Mrs. Jacob Blakey and her son, Samuel, two years old, were drowned to-night while attempting to ford East Pike Run, in Washington county, near here.

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The Committee on Police, Elections and Schools met last night and accepted the vehicle license lists furnished by Hotzer & Wrenn, and ordered the payment of the bill. Their bid had previously been accepted. The committee will meet again on Tuesday night to consider certain charges against an employe of the dog pound, one of the dog-catchers, of whose methods and language in taking care of dogs, it is believed, had been made. The matter was brought to the committee's attention by Messrs. Lea, Neagle and Powers were named as a subcommittee to make up an estimate of the needs of the department for the budget. The committee expects that something like 2,500 or 3,000 dogs will have to be impounded as a result of annexation. The dog census of the city, or rather the number licensed last year, was slightly in excess of 5,000, in addition to 1,287 were killed of the 1,558 impounded. A few others were redeemed.

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
