ONE-ARM BILL IS DEAD
Gambler Who Killed County Attorney Dies from Wounds in Jail.

FORT WORTH, TEXAS, March 24.—William Tomlinson, alias "One-Arm Bill" Tomlinson, a gambler, who yesterday assassinated County Attorney McLean and probably fatally wounded Deputy Sheriff Scott, died last night in the county jail of wounds sustained during a fight with policemen. Scott is still alive.

WELDON ICE FLAT TOTALLY DESTROYED
Loss Will Exceed \$12,000—Insurance Amounted to \$7,000.

WELDON, N. C., March 24.—The Weldon Ice Factory was burned this morning at 3 o'clock, the loss being \$12,000. Insurance, \$7,000, was placed on the factory by the Citizens' Fire Insurance Co. of New York, \$2,500, Home, Greenleaf, \$2,000, York, \$1,250, Underwriters, Greensboro, \$1,250. The origin of the fire is a mystery, as no fire has been about the premises for some time.

COYTEYOU AND WOODRUFF CONFER WITH PRESIDENT
WASHINGTON, March 24.—Secretary of the Treasury, Woodruff, and Chairman of the Republican National Committee, Coyteyou, were in conference with President Roosevelt at the White House for more than two hours this afternoon, according to the official campaign plans for 1908, but that candidates were not discussed.

BURTON SAYS HE DECLINED PARDON
Would Not Accept It from President—Statement Denied by Attorney in Charge of Pardons.

ABILENE, KAN., March 24.—Former United States Senator J. R. Burton, after delivering the speech which he had prepared in advance, made the statement last night that the President had offered him a pardon. He said: "Five days after I was put in jail the President offered me a pardon. It came to me personally at Ironton. The communication was over the signature of the pardon clerk. I never answered it—I would not answer it. I would not accept a pardon from any man under any conditions. He gentlemen, he is the one that should have the pardon."

GERMANY LAUGHS AT BRITISH PREMIER
Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's Disarmament Scheme Excites Hilarity of Teutons.

BERLIN, March 24.—Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's disarmament propositions excite hilarious comment in Germany. The premier's interjection during Mr. Balfour's speech in the House yesterday, that it would be at the suggestion of Mr. Balfour if continental diplomatists compared the declarations of the premier in peace with the statements made by Mr. Balfour, and the attitude regarded as an insult to the intelligence of German officers.

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FAMINE IN CHINA ALARMS EMPRESS
People, Crazy With Hunger and Want, May Overthrow Ruling Dynasty.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24.—From Shanghai advices received at the State Department, it appears that the ruling dynasty in China is seriously alarmed over the effect of the spread of famine throughout the country, and the opportunity it offers to seditious societies to enlist converts to the cause directed against the government.

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The information received here indicates that a propaganda has been organized to further the circulation of stories of the character outlined, and it is said that State Department officials fear that a spread of hysteria may engender a general uprising.

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An extra effort will be made in the United States to broaden the scope of the movement to find relief for the Chinese people. There have been large sums of money collected and dispatched to China to be used in the purchase of food and in the near future the transport of relief supplies from San Francisco with a shipload of provisions given by Louis Klopsch, editor of the Christian Herald.

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A general movement throughout the civilized world to aid the sufferers, it is believed, will enable the Chinese government to strengthen its hands and possibly suppress uprising and riots.

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For the protection of foreigners in China the United States and European countries are being urged to send a large number of military and naval forces to the Celestial Empire.

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That any movement which threatens the overthrow of the present dynasty in China gives alarm to the United States, and every European nation which has interests and people in China, is not denied. The life of every white person in China is believed to depend upon the continuance of government as it stands, the Boxer uprising being cited as an instance of what might result if the present government should be weakened.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—By complying with the demands of a commission in lunacy, should it come to pass, in the discretion of Justice Fitzgerald, that an examination as to the present sanity of the prisoner is imperative, Harry K. Thaw has planned to discount the sensation which District Attorney Jerome sprung by halting the trial last week.

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It was learned from an unimpeachable authority that Thaw himself took the initiative in this determination. Experts say that it is in his power, as a prisoner, charged with a capital crime, to impede the work of a commission to a greater or less extent. He is confident, however, of convincing a commission of his complete sanity. In case he is summoned before a commission he will not take advantage of legal devices to thwart the examination.

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Thaw is credited with stating tersely the position he will take should the contingency arise, as follows: "I will submit to all phases of an examination which is rational and reasonable. I should refuse to obey, for instance, if I were asked to stand on my head, but as for mental and physical tests propounded in good faith, I am competent to undergo them."

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"I believe that Justice Fitzgerald will not appoint a commission," Clifford W. Hartridge, Thaw's counsel of record, said to-night.

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"I am making preparations for a resumption of the trial on Wednesday. The case will probably be summed up on its merits on Thursday and Friday, and go to the jury Friday night."

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HARRY THAW CANNOT SECURE A DIVORCE
If He Is Declared Insane His Marriage to Evelyn Will Remain Valid.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) PITTSBURG, Pa., March 24.—The revival of the rumor that Harry K. Thaw and his wife are to become separated regardless of the result of his trial for the slaying of Stanford White, has caused no end of discussion here. The case will probably be summed up on its merits on Thursday and Friday, and go to the jury Friday night.

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There are no grounds for the rumors, and many lawyers who have given the matter careful thought, declare that Thaw would have great difficulty in securing a divorce from Evelyn on grounds based on the testimony offered at the murder trial. Should Thaw be declared insane at the present time and also at the time he married Evelyn Nesbit, this alone would not invalidate the marriage, according to the best legal authorities here. A marriage under the laws of this State is purely a civil contract, and even though it is admitted that one of the parties is insane at the time the contract is entered into, it must be proven that the same party to the contract procured the marriage with intent to commit fraud.

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From the testimony given at the murder trial the local attorneys are of the opinion that it would be impossible for Thaw to prove that Evelyn Nesbit had practiced any fraud.

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"Evidence already offered to the effect that Thaw was fully informed of all the incidents of her life before he married her would make it extremely hard for him to secure a divorce."

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
