STEAMBOAT AND RAILROAD NEWS

Lines All Doing Best to Meet Demands of Crowds at Jamestown Exposition.

Of course, there are kickers everywhere and not a few of them are in the good old State of Virginia. When they have nothing else to talk about they throw away at the railroad companies. Possibly they do this because they feel sure that the railroads can stand it. But be this as it may, the fact is that the railroads are coming in for a full share of the kicking that is being done at the Jamestown Exposition management. The railroads are being blamed for very much of the trouble that opening-day visitors had to contend with.

Perhaps the roads were somewhat at fault, but it must be remembered that only once in three hundred years are Virginia lines expected to provide taken notice for a Jamestown crowd. All things considered, they handled the first day crowds as well as could be expected under the circumstances.

The steamboat lines that ply on the streams of Tidewater Virginia are doing their best to meet the demands of the terecentenary crowds, and the people who attended the opening exercises of the Jamestown show Friday are of the opinion that they met the situation very well. Of course, there were hitches and delays, but it takes practice to make perfect, and maybe even well-regulated steamboats need a little practice.

The following is from the New York Wall Street Journal:

"The Seaboard Air Line has fifty thousand tons of coal on hand in July and August delivery. The road is now receiving deliveries of additional freight cars, and still has a number of these under contract. Construction work under way consists principally of enlarging terminals at important traffic centres, and providing additional export facilities at Tampa, Jacksonville, Savannah and Wilmington. For this reason the management believes that the road will be in a position to handle the summer and fall tide of traffic with greater despatch than last year, even though the volume of shipments should again increase. The most important feature of the road's new facilities will be the additional motive power, to the lack of which the management attributes in large measure the inadequate service of shippers of the past year or two.

An officer of the Seaboard says that Southern farmers are apparently seeking to make up for the shortage of labor by supplying themselves with more farm machinery. Shipments of fertilizers this year have been rather less than usual, but shipments of farm implements have increased. Both of these results, he attributes to the same cause, namely, lack of labor. The same trouble, he adds, afflict the railroads themselves, being the chief difficulty with which the Seaboard at least is contending in its efforts to take care of the unprecedented volume of business offered."

SEEKING DIVORCE.

Stafford County Darkies Find Matrimonial Road Hard to Travel. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) FREDERICKSBURG, Va., April 27.—Fish are now running better in the Rappahannock and Potomac rivers than at any time this season. The big seines are making good hauls, and prices are cheaper for all kinds of fish.

An Educational League has been organized at Port Royal in Caroline county, with Dr. C. U. Gravatt president, A. F. Turner vice-president and Mrs. Hamilton Carter, secretary.

In Stafford county, just across the Rappahannock River from this city, forty-two applications for divorce have been made in the courts of that county for the period from January 1, 1887, to December 31, 1906. Of these thirty-six applicants were granted and six refused. Of the number five were negroes and three of the applicants were granted. During that time 1,121 marriage licenses have been issued.

Fireman Seriously Scalded.

ONANCOCK, Va., April 27.—As the local excursion train on the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk Railroad for the Jamestown Exposition stopped at Meffa yesterday morning, the steam pipe in the cab burst, scalding the fireman, Joseph Conquest, son of Mr. N. B. Conquest, of Atlantic, Va., so badly that his death is looked for at any moment. Engineer West, of New Church, Va., was scalded, but not seriously. Dr. John W. Bowdoin was among the passengers, and promptly used every effort to relieve their suffering.
