

BAGLEY'S CHUMS TO ATTEND UNVEILING

Arrangements Being Made for Gathering of Young Hero's Friends.

CHARTER FOR LAUNDRY

This Enterprise Was Started Because Other Raleigh Laundries Raised Prices.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] RALEIGH, N. C., May 7.—An arrangement is being made for the schoolmates of Ensign Worth Bagley in the old Raleigh Male Academy to attend the unveiling ceremonies for the Bagley Statue May 20th. Prof. Hugh Morson and C. B. Denison have the matter in charge.

The Wake county sanitary board has re-elected Dr. J. W. McFee, Jr., county physician. The Wake County Board of Commissioners have passed an order referring standing rewards for the recapture of convicts that may escape from the county workhouse. The rewards are \$5 for men and \$2.50 for women.

The Swansboro Land and Lumber Company, of Onslow county, increases its capital from \$150,000 to \$225,000. T. H. Pritchard is one of the principal incorporators.

Charter People's Laundry. A charter was issued to-day for the People's Laundry Company, of Raleigh, having for its purpose the establishment of a laundry in opposition to the three laundries at present doing business in Raleigh, because of the recent 25 per cent. advance in the charges for laundry work, which raised a storm of opposition. The increase was the outcome of the recent State Convention of Laundries, and was intended to be the beginning of a movement that would affect nearly every town in the State. The defense for the increase in charges is that all the laundry supplies have advanced at an even higher rate than the increase on charges for laundry. The People's Laundry, in which several hundred citizens have stock, will operate on the old schedule. The capital is \$25,000.

State Treasurer B. R. Lacy says the sheriffs of the various counties in the State are settling up State and special taxes exceptionally well this year. About 80 per cent. have already settled in full and a number of the others in part.

A petition in bankruptcy is filed in the office of the clerk of the Federal Court here for W. M. Gardner, of Rocky Mount, the liabilities being \$975, and the assets \$450. Gardner is a merchant.

FATAL LIVE WIRE.

Young Carolina Man Instantly Killed at Chattanooga.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] GREENSBORO, N. C., May 7.—Ernest Keach, aged twenty, son of Mrs. Liney Keach, of this city, was instantly killed at Chattanooga, Tenn., this morning by contact with a live wire. He was engaged as superintendent of linemen of the East Tennessee Telephone Company. The remains will reach here to-morrow en route to Tarboro, his former home, for burial there.

TRAIN DERAILED.

Southern Passenger Express Jumps Track.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] SPENCER, N. C., May 7.—Speeding at thirty miles an hour, northbound passenger train No. 38, on the Southern Railway, was derailed near Lexington, fifteen miles north of Spencer, at midnight last night, and the train crew, as well as passengers, had a narrow escape from serious injury. Engineer A. R. Rowley was slightly hurt by being struck by the debris. L. E. Vaughan, the colored fireman, was seriously smashed under the tender. None of the passengers were injured. The engine tender, a baggage and one mail car were derailed, and the track was blocked for twelve hours, being cleared at noon to-day. The wreck is said to have resulted from a split switch.

ALL MEMBERS CHAIRMEN.

That Is, They Make Chairs—Association Elects Officers.

INDORSE MAYOR'S ACTION.

But Chief of Raleigh Fire Department Will Be Reinstated.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] RALEIGH, N. C., May 7.—The Board of Aldermen this evening, in the appeal of John W. Mangum from the order of Mayor Johnson, suspending Mangum, decided to reinstate him. The Board, by irregularities in office, adopted resolutions endorsing the action of the Mayor in suspending Mangum, but providing for his reinstatement on and after June 1st. The Aldermen declare that while the evidence showed many irregularities in Mangum's conduct, there was nothing criminal, and his work as chief was highly commendable. The hope was expressed that the hearing just closed would do a good effect on the future management of the office of chief and on all other departments of the city government.

Install Pastor Doan.

The services consisted of an impressive sermon by Rev. T. J. Taylor, of Warrenton, N. C., on "The Church of the Living God." Rev. J. D. Hepburn, D. D., presided and conducted the installation. A number of new members were received into the church at the close of the morning service. At night Dr. Hepburn spoke on the "Planting and Growth of the Baptists of North Carolina," and the address was full of interesting historical matter.

Colonel Means to Speak.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] SALISBURY, N. C., May 7.—The Confederate veterans of Rowan and adjoining counties will be addressed on Memorial Day, the 10th inst., by Col. Paul B. Means, of Concord. He is not only a Confederate veteran widely known in the State, but is also a fluent speaker, and will give his hearers a fine address. Elaborate preparations are being made for a big dinner complimentary to the veterans in attendance on that occasion.

Sinking Artesian Well.

C., May 7.—The Southern Railway Company is sinking an artesian well on its premises at Spencer for the purpose of supplying good drinking water to the 2,000 or more employees in the shops at this place. The well, which is being sunk by the Snyder Pump and Well Works, of Richmond, will go several hundred feet underground, and when completed the water works system will be connected with all departments of the shops here.

BODY OF WHITE MAN IN ELIZABETH RIVER

Letter Found in Pocket Would Indicate That He Was P. E. Linn.

SMITHFIELD HAMS BURN

Two Smoke-Houses Burn, With Loss of About \$10,000—No Insurance.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] NORFOLK, VA., May 7.—The body of a white man supposed to be P. E. Linn, about thirty-three years of age, was found floating in the Elizabeth River, off the Norfolk and Southern Railway Company's wharf, this morning shortly after 5 o'clock by an old fisherman, who was on the wharf when the body came to the surface.

The body was well dressed, and in the pockets were found letters addressed to P. E. Linn, and a pawn ticket which bore the date of May 6th. The body was removed to the morgue, where an inquest will be held by Coroner Knight to-morrow. The cause of the death can only yet be surmised, but it was probably a suicide or an accident.

Broiled Smithfield Ham.

Information was received here from Smithfield to-day to the effect that two smoke-houses and a stable, owned by B. P. Chapman, were totally destroyed by fire this morning, entailing a loss of about \$10,000. The smoke-houses were filled with Smithfield hams. The origin of the fire, it is believed, was from a blaze kindled to smoke the meat. It was 3 o'clock when the fire was discovered, and had not the town water works furnished ample water under strong pressure there would probably have been a much greater loss. The Chapman home, directly in front of the smoke-house, and the Baptist Church, next door to the home, were threatened, but neither was injured. It is reported that there was no insurance on the smoke-houses and stable.

BUSY COURT TERM.

Both Criminal and Civil Docket Are Large.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] ONANCOCK, VA., May 7.—The May term of the Circuit Court, Judge Blackstone presiding, began yesterday. Criminal and civil dockets are both very large, and much of the business will necessarily be continued.

It is generally considered that there will be no change in the representation of Accomac and Northampton in the coming Legislature. Senator B. T. Gunter and Delegates John R. Holt and John Wilkins are candidates for re-election, and have no opposition. The Irish potato crop is looking well and making rapid gains. Sweet potatoes are being set out in large numbers. Strawberries will be late. Many patches are in full bloom. Quite a number of entries for the Tassel Fair are already on the grounds and undergoing training. The list promises fine sport.

Dr. O. L. Powell has sold his farm, situated on the bay side, containing 152 acres, to Mr. William C. West for \$9,000. The changeable and stormy weather has interfered with sturgeon fishing. So far the catch has not been remunerative. Rock are being caught in paying quantities. One boat landed 2,800 of good size at the wharf this morning for shipment. The many candidates for county treasurer and sheriff are again actively at work. There are seven candidates for treasurer and five for sheriff. The primary election has been ordered for June 25th.

BRING THURMAN BACK.

Man Being Held for Murder of Dolsen, Now in Norfolk.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] NORFOLK, VA., May 7.—Leo C. Thurman, the alleged slayer of W. P. Dolsen in an East Main Street boarding house in February of last year, and for whom the police of the entire country have been searching, was brought here to-night by Norfolk Police Officers Stephenson and Powers from Vancouver, B. C. The prisoner makes no denial of the fact that he is Thurman, but will not discuss the crime with which he is charged.

A Norfolk officer was hot on his trail through various towns in Eastern North Carolina for a week or two before he was committed, but he finally eluded his pursuers. Passing through the Southern States he went into Mexico and up the Pacific coast to Vancouver. He seemed cheerful on his arrival here and told the police that they had done him a great favor in bringing him back.

SMALLPOX WIDESPREAD.

Disease Has Gained Considerable Foothold in Clinch Valley.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] GATE CITY, VA., May 7.—Drs. Chaffek and Horton, of the State Board of Health, have investigated the disease that has been prevalent on Clinch Mountain some time, and pronounce it smallpox. It is spread over a wide territory, but no deaths have resulted. The nearest cases are ten miles west of Gate City, and it extends down the river into Tennessee. The report of the doctors produced a great deal of excitement, and Gate City was quarantined against the affected section.

Change Primary Date.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] LEBESBURG, VA., May 7.—The Democratic executive committee of Loudoun met here to-day to reconsider their former decision in fixing June 13th as the date for holding the primary for the nomination of candidates for county and district offices. The date finally fixed for the county primary was June 19th, to coincide with the primary to be held on that date for the nomination of a candidate for Congress in the Eighth Virginia District.

Mr. Tackett All Right.

LYNCHBURG, VA., May 7.—Already thirty-one members of the boys' department of the Young Men's Christian Association have returned to camp in the encampment and outing of the department, which is to take place from July 22d to August 30d, at some convenient and proper point on the James River, above the city.

THOMAS MAYOR.

Administration Ticket in Spencer Wins, with Single Exception. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] SPENCER, N. C., May 7.—P. R. Thomas, the administration nominee

for Mayor of Spencer, was elected to-day by a majority of forty-three over W. D. Fathel, the nominee of the independents. The regular nominees on the Thomas ticket for Alderman were elected by handsome majorities, with the exception of Thomas W. Stewart, who was beaten by Dr. M. L. Sumner, an independent nominee. The Aldermen elected included Dorsett, H. G. Elmore, W. C. Gatewood, W. L. Ray, M. L. Sumner and C. P. Vancannon, the latter leading the ticket.

RE-ELECT BOYDEN.

Salisbury Chooses Him for Fourth Term.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] SALISBURY, N. C., May 7.—A. H. Boyden was to-day elected Mayor of Salisbury for a fourth term in succession. Eight Aldermen were elected, including A. Parker, C. Kessler, J. S. Henshaw, Daniel, W. C. Maupin, W. B. Strachan, C. L. Welch and J. V. Wallace. Several of the Aldermen have served much duty in this city, and the Board is a strong one. There was no opposition to the straight Democratic ticket, and the election passed quietly. Mayor Boyden enters the term of his eighth year as the chief executive of Salisbury.

CITIZENS' TICKET.

This Wins in East Spencer—E. A. Long Mayor.

C., May 7.—The municipal election in East Spencer, adjoining Spencer proper, held to-day, resulted in the election of the Citizens' ticket straight over the regular nominees. E. A. Long was chosen Mayor by a majority of twenty, and E. H. Brown, J. L. Bowles, T. A. Howell and L. T. Brown were elected Aldermen.

SMALL VOTE CAST.

But Democrats Had Selected Their Men and Victory Was Easy. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] GREENSBORO, N. C., May 7.—In the election for city officers here to-day only five hundred votes were cast, the nominee of the Democratic primary, at which 1,800 votes were polled, being elected without opposition. They are L. J. Brandt, Mayor; E. A. Brown, John L. King, Neill Ellington, C. C. McLean, Thomas Glascock, Edward Bain, Aldermen.

Will Own Water-Works.
