

NEWSPAPER MEN OUT WITH EXPOSITION EXPRESS COMPANY NOT REGULAR BANK

Serious Clash With Management—Occurs Because of Insolence on Part of Guard.

WILL STAND IT NO LONGER MAY APPEAL TO COURTS

No Soft Tones in Colors of "Bad Breaks" Will Hereafter Be Presented, They Say.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] NORFOLK, Va., May 12.—A serious clash between the management of the Jamestown Exposition and newspaper men occurred today, when a non-commissioned officer of the Powhatan Guard, the exposition police, arrested Justin Perival, a newspaper and magazine writer, who is well known throughout the country, and Joseph R. Curtis, a former newspaper man of Atlanta, both of whom are connected with the exploitation department of the exposition, because it was alleged that one of the two called a member of the guard a "father" when the latter offered him an insulting word as the two were passing over the Lee Parade. The newspaper men who have visited the exposition claim that they have been repeatedly insulted and rebuffed in their work by members of the guard, who seem to be both insolent and incompetent, and they say that they will stand it no longer.

Nothing More to Do With It. The incident today provoked an outbreak on the part of the news gatherers, and they say that unless the exposition officials recall the guards or instruct them to be more courteous in the future, that they will have nothing more to do with the exposition. Captain Carpenter, commanding officer of the guard, was profuse in his apologies to the newspaper men when he heard of the arrests, and had all charges removed. The newspaper men were carried to the headquarters of the guard, where they were pooled until Captain Carpenter could be found. They were inclined to take the entire matter as a joke, but other newspaper men said that the time for a climax had come, and hence the matter was stirred up. The exposition has been "outed" highly by the newspaper men, many had breaks of mismanagement being overlooked. In the future, all matters will be handled with unglued hands, it is said.

DREW GUN ON OFFICER. William Simms Gets Year in Jail and Heavy Fine.

William Simms, arrested a few days ago by Officer Tate, was heard yesterday morning in the Police Court and was sentenced to a year in jail and to pay a fine of \$100, on the charge of carrying concealed weapons and drawing a revolver on Officer Tate. Officers Tate and Bradley, mounted, pursued Simms into an alley, and Officer Tate testified that Simms drew his gun as if he were about to fire on him. Bradley was nearby, and he arrested the man.

EXCITING RUNAWAY. Mr. Hughes Is Hurt and Wagon Is Damaged.

A horse being driven by Mr. Waverly Hughes, a prominent young farmer of Varina District, became frightened yesterday morning, and started out in flight. He was not stopped until he had run into several wagons and created much excitement in his path. Mr. Hughes was thrown to the ground, and his hip was badly bruised. The wagon was badly damaged.

NURSES AT THE FAIR. Large Number of Delegates to National Convention Go to Jamestown.

Colored Man's Home in Gordonsville Destroyed; Child Had Been Left Alone. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] GORDONSVILLE, Va., May 12.—The dwelling-house of George Perkins, a colored man living about half a mile from Gordonsville, in what is commonly known as "Koozoo Town," was destroyed by fire about 6 o'clock this evening. The seven-year-old child of Perkins, who was in the house at the time, was burned to death before it could be rescued.

MRS. EDDY NOT KEPT IN DARK

Trustees Deny That Christian Science Leader Is Being Secluded. CONCORD, N. H., May 12.—Attorney-General Edwin G. Eastman, Samuel J. Elder and William A. Morse, counsel for the original ten defendants in the suit in equity brought by "next friends" to secure an accounting of the property of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, to-day made answer in the Superior Court to the supplemental bill filed by the plaintiffs. The defendants in their answer deny that they procured or induced Mrs. Eddy to transfer her property under a trust deed to Henry M. Baker, Archibald McLellan and Josiah E. Ferrand, and they deny that the three trustees are the agents or attorneys of the defendants. They severally deny that there is any combination whatever to surround and seclude Mrs. Eddy, or take charge, possession and control of her property, and they deny that there is any reason to believe that any money or property of Mrs. Eddy's has been misappropriated.
