## KILLED HIMSELF BECAUSE OF LOVE

New Orleans Man, Jilted, Takes Dose of Carbolic Acid.

## MADE DELIBERATE PLANS

Rudolph Gardner, Alleged Embezzler, Sent Back to Prison from Georgia.

NEW ORLEANS, LA., May 30.—Because he could not wed Miss Kate Follo, with whom he had been in love for some months, Nicholas Gagliano killed himself by taking carbolic acid to-day. The act was deliberately planned and Gagliano did not attempt to deny why he had decided to commit suicide.

Rudolph Gardner, who is alleged to have embezzled funds from the Southern Pacific Railway Company, and who was captured in Georgia, was brought here to-day.

Rev. Peter H. J. Van Allen, a Catholic rector, died to-day at Crowley.

## TAFT SPEAKS TO MILLERS

Secretary Delivers Address to Big Convention in St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, MO., May 30.—Before an audience of miners from all parts of the country attending the mass convention of the Millers' National Federation and marking the largest gathering of millers ever held in this country, Secretary of War William H. Taft this afternoon made an address at the Edison on the topic, "Recent Instances of National Avarice."

The assembly constituted the final session of the convention of the federation, which had invited Secretary Taft to address the body. President J. W. Burk, of Springfield, O., presided, and introduced former Governor of Missouri, Stanley A. Miller, of St. Louis, who in turn made a brief speech introducing Secretary Taft.

## COURT OF APPEALS SITTING IN ASHEVILLE

## TRAVELING MAN HURT IN RAILROAD ACCIDENT

HIDISTOL, TENN., May 30.—While endeavoring to board a passenger train on the Norfolk and Western Railway at Radford, Va., to-day, Fred W. Cartwright, a popular Bristol traveling man, was thrown under the car wheels. His right leg was severed and the flesh was torn from his left arm. He also suffered the loss of an eye and was otherwise severely injured about the head. It is feared the injuries will prove fatal. He was removed to the Valley View hospital at Radford for the attention of the surgeons.

## To Erect Weaver Mill in North Carolina

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., May 30.—The McNeill Manufacturing Company has been organized here. W. D. McNeill, president; J. V. McGougan, vice-president; C. L. Ponderton, secretary and treasurer, to erect a 10,000-spindle weaver mill at a cost of \$200,000, on Little River, ten miles west of the city. The company has a water-power of 700-horse, 300 of which will be used at the start.

## VICTIMIZED MERCHANTS WITH WORTHLESS CHECKS

## P. J. MCGOVERN, OF ATLANTA, DIES IN EL PASO, TEX.

ATLANTA, GA., May 30.—A dispatch from El Paso, Tex., to-day announced the death there of P. J. McGovern, of Atlanta, chairman of the Southern classification committee, one of the best known railroad men in the Southern territory. Death resulted from pulmonary trouble, for the relief of which Mr. McGovern went to Texas several months ago. He was born in Cincinnati fifty-one years ago.

## MRS. MCGRIDGE LOST HER DAMAGE SUIT

Wanted Money from Sheriff at Memphis, but Jury Refused It.

## REGULAR FLOOD IN NEW ORLEANS

Parts of City Under Water and Great Damage to the Crops.

NEW ORLEANS, LA., May 30.—A fifteen-minute rain to-day temporarily put several sections of New Orleans under water, which filled the streets, overran sidewalks, backed up into yards and marooned hundreds in their homes. Reports of the South Louisiana and Mississippi are that heavy rains have been falling, doing more damage to crops.

## GEORGIA JURY CONVICTS WHITE MAN AND NEGRO

BUCHANAN, GA., May 30.—After deliberating all night the jury in the case of Ben Adams, white, and William Lee, colored, charged with the murder of Reese Jones, a white man, February 11th last, returned a verdict to-day of guilty and recommended life imprisonment for both men. The evidence against the defendants was entirely circumstantial. Motions for a new trial were made for both prisoners.

## Boy Killed by Train

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] ASHEVILLE, N. C., May 30.—A fifteen-year-old boy named Stanley Harris, whose home is in Bridgewater, N. C., was struck by a train and almost instantly killed yesterday afternoon in the Southern Railway yards.

## Decorated the Graves

SALISBURY, N. C., May 30.—Memorial Day was fittingly celebrated to-day. The graves of 12,000 Federal dead in the cemetery were decorated. Hancock Camp, G. A. R., of Charlotte, participating. Ten thousand well-behaved negroes were in town, coming from a dozen nearby towns and cities.

## Memorial Day at Marietta

MARIETTA, GA., May 30.—Memorial Day was appropriately observed at the National Cemetery here to-day, a detachment of the Seventeenth United States Infantry, stationed at Fort McPherson, attended under command of General W. S. Ederly, commanding the Department of the Gulf.

## Trouble at Baton Rouge

BATON ROUGE, LA., May 30.—For more than two hours to-day, Joe Poston, an insane negro, armed with an axe, defied the police and a large number of citizens who endeavored to capture him. He was shot before making a final surrender.

## Robbed by Burglars

Last night burglars entered the residence of Messrs. Smith, on Coll Spring Lane, and I. W. Clark, on Rowan Street. They were frightened off in the first case, but got a watch and other valuable in the second.

## Flowers on Federal Graves

ANDERSONVILLE, GA., May 30.—Decoration Day was appropriately observed here to-day, and the graves of the Federal dead were adorned with flowers. A special train brought many G. A. R. men from Fitzgerald, and a number were present from Columbus, O.

Another Judge Appointed to Hear Kentucky's Famous Case.

## SUPREINTENDENT KELLY DEAD

Korean Medical College Graduate Joins Masonic Order.

LOUISVILLE, KY., May 30.—The trial of James Hargis, of Breathitt county, has been continued until July 9th. Judge Dougherty, of Owingsville, who will preside is satisfactory to the prosecution and the defense, and it is expected that the hearing will proceed without delay.

Isaac A. Kelly, superintendent of the Masonic Widows' and Orphans' Home, died this afternoon after a lingering illness.

Kung Sun Oh, a member of the graduating class of the Hospital College of Medicine, is the first Korean to become a Mason.

In the Memorial parade to-day, Colonel W. B. Huldemar, a Confederate soldier, led a party of soldiers and took a prominent part in the ceremonies.

The State Prohibition Convention to-day elected Mrs. Frances Beauchamp, of Lexington, a member of the Prohibition National Committee.

## GEORGIA NEGRO TO DIE FOR KILLING DOCTOR

DARIEN, GA., May 30.—Lee Holmes, the negro who shot and killed Dr. Sands at Darien Junction, was tried and convicted to-day of murder and sentenced to be hanged here on July 19th. The sheriff took the prisoner back to Savannah for safe keeping. Holmes was threatened by mob violence here some days ago.

## MUST PRODUCE WIDOW UNDER ORDER OF COURT

LOUIS, MO., May 30.—A writ of habeas corpus, issued to-day, requires St. Vincent's Asylum to produce the widow of Senator Tom Connor, Joplin's mining millionaire, in connection with a contest over Connor's will. Her nephew expects to prove her sane, though in an insane ward twenty years ago.

## GOLDSTEIN ACQUITTED OF ARSON CHARGE

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C., May 30.—After being out for twelve hours the jury in the case of D. G. Goldstein, a Hebrew, indicted for attempting to burn his home to secure insurance, this afternoon returned a verdict of not guilty.

## Medals at Conservatory

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## DENTIST ARRESTED FOR WOMAN'S DEATH

## NORTH CAROLINA NEGRO HANGED FOR MURDER

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 30.—John Matthis, a negro, was hanged at Clinton, N. C., to-day for the murder of his stepfather, Tom Merritt. Matthis severed his victim's head from the body with a single blow from an axe and then burned Merritt's home to conceal the crime. The crime was committed over two years ago, and the murderer was only captured last month.

## ROOSEVELT CHOICE OF PARTY LEADERS

Twelve Out of Twenty-Four Republican States Favor Him Again.

LOUIS, MO., May 30.—The Times, which asked members of the Republican National Committee and other authorities of the various States regarding presidential sentiment, to-day prints replies from twenty-four States. Five declare for Taft, and one each for Cannon, Knox, Root and LaFollette.

## INFERNAL MACHINE MAN BEING TRIED

Fred Bush, of Atlanta, Faces Jury on Very Serious Charge.

## SENT IT TO HIS SWEETHEART

Girl's Mother Was Injured and Her Residence Badly Wrecked.

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.] ATLANTA, GA., May 30.—Fred Bush, the young white man recently indicted by the grand jury for sending an infernal machine to Miss Kate McCarthy, was put on trial in the Criminal Court here to-day. When the package was opened it exploded, partially wrecking the residence and severely injuring the mother of Miss McCarthy. It was alleged that Bush was in love with the young woman, and was jealous of a rival, who happened to be his roommate. Much evidence was submitted by the prosecution, and it is expected that the case will go to the jury some time to-morrow.
